Introducing the



Proviso West-High School



The dedication of Proviso West High School or of a dream. Beginning in the minds of interested citizens, Proviso West had progressed through a maze of drawing boards and construction work and emerged in the fall of 1958 sufficiently prepared for her first freshmen and sophomores.

This expansive architectural masterpiece boasts modern facilities and equipment, an excellent teaching and administrative staff, and room to expand to provide for future township growth. A decorative mosaic mural adorns the curved surface of the libraryadministrative building. Designed by Oscar Howe, the mural symbolizes the Sioux Indians' song of nature. Artistic patterns against a plain background provide the rhythm for the song. Against the backdrop of sky and sea, the mural reveals the medicine man, the flute player, an Indian baby in a cradle, an Indian doll, a fire and kettle in front of a tepee, a mystical bird, the eagle and the antelope, an Indian scaffold burial, an Indian horseman, and to balance the composition, the medicine man again. The Indians' search for the true meaning of life, the belief that naturalism comes before realism, the realization that an appreciation and understanding of na-

ture is the basis for the enjoyment of life's finest arts: these are the teachings of the mosaic mural at the east end of the mall.

The completion of the physical structure marked the origin of another mosaic. This real-life mural is the panorama of activities at Proviso West. As in the mosaic in the mall, many tiny pieces each contribute a necessary segment to the whole picture. Freshmen and sophomores placed the first pieces . . . Service Club, Girls Club; juniors modified . . . Student Council, Girls' League . . . and added . . . Interim League competition, Key Club, the *Profile*; seniors completed . . . class rings, National Honor Society, Oklahoma!, the prom, diplomas. Superintendent Leroy J. Knoeppel

Superintending two four-year high schools consumes most of Dr. LeRoy J. Knoeppel's time and energy. He divides his attentions between Proviso West and Proviso East through the administration of educational policies and special student activities. In this way, he sees each student body developing a distinct character from one basic administrative pattern.

Dr. Knoeppel received his B.A. degree at Carthage College and his M.A. at the University of Iowa. For his outstanding achievements in education, Carthage awarded him an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Besides holding life membership in the National Education Association and affiliated organizations, he is actively a member of the American Association of School Administrators and the National Association of Secondary School Principals. He also participates in workshops, institutes, and committees whose programs are designed to improve public school education.

A good school meets the needs of the community it serves. By evaluating new trends and objectives and by stressing continuity in elementary, secondary, and post-secondary school programs, Dr. Knoeppel dedicates himself to secure this end.

Board Represents Citizens in School Planning

Scheduling faculty, maintenance, and secretarial salaries, supervising plumbing and grounds repairs, and planning Proviso West's physical growth, the Board of Education met regularly on the third Tuesday of every month. Open to the general public, the sessions occurred in the Board of Education room at Proviso East.

With suggestions from Dr. Knoeppel, the Board members formulated administrative policies for both high schools in District No. 209. They developed scholastic and athletic superiority in the community's students by hiring the best available teaching talent. They promoted academic achievement by purchasing enlightening texts and rewarding outstanding success.

As representatives of Proviso Township's citizens, these men worked to satisfy the desires of nearly eighty thousand voters. Professional and business people in their own rights, they handled the necessary financial business with brisk efficiency. In appropriating tax money to various funds, they used wisdom and foresight. The well-operated school system under the authority of the Board of Education, headed by Doctor Louis Seno, president, spoke for itself.

Assistant Superintendent Edward W. Stubbs

Expanding Proviso West's facilities to meet a four-year high school's needs and attending educator's conferences to learn the latest administrative techniques kept Mr. Edward Stubbs fully occupied this year. As principal and assistant superintendent, he exerted every effort to improve the school.

One gratification for his long hours of work came when the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools accredited Proviso West. The Association found the school to have well-behaved students instructed in suitable classroom conditions by an excellent teaching staff. Mr. Stubbs has taken pride in the distinct atmosphere of study and deportment he has nurtured for three years.

He expressed his philosophy in a quotation from James Conant: "Our purpose is to cultivate in the largest number of our future citizens an appreciation of both the responsibilities and the benefits which come to them because they are American and free."

With a thorough knowledge of West's detailed structure, Principal Stubbs spoke for the school to the community through such organizations as the Parent-Teacher Association. For curious audiences he answered questions on the number of dollars spent per student per year, the number of boys participating in the sports program, and the number of students predicted in future enrollment. These chores and many others he performed with the grace and dignity of his position as assistant superintendent.

Dean of Students Hubert A. Pitt

Searching for the culprit who pulled a false fire alarm and speaking with parents constituted only a portion of Mr. Hubert A. Pitt's duties as Dean of Students. His official assignment included all students, not only those who were considered disciplinary problems.

Before assuming his present responsibilities, Mr. Pitt had experienced working with teenage leaders in Student Council. Thus, he expected some of the bold projects young people hoped to initiate at Proviso West. Unless the plans benefitted the entire student body, he vetoed them. He affixed his stamp of approval, however, to many schemes such as the Thanksgiving clothing drive, the Christmas post office, and the inter-organizational council.

From signing bulletins on behavior and posters for publicity to arousing emotions at senior gatherings and enthusiasm at pep assemblies, the Dean received the admiration and respect of the twenty-eight hundred West students. His down-to-earth attitude generated in the students a willingness to cooperate; therefore, they accepted his direction and coordination of their activities with appreciation.

Sharing the burden of administrative responsibility with Mr. Stubbs, Mr. Arthur Vallicelli performs a variety of tasks daily. From answering student queries on new policies to directing the preparation of the daily bulletin, he solves a host of problems.

Far from inexperienced in the problem-solving business, he applies the same psychological techniques as Administrative Assistant that he did as a counselor. Until this year he headed the guidance department at Proviso West, broadening his background for his present position of authority.

Now "Mr. Val" guides the IBM machine's operation through the work of program cards and report cards. Because of his tirelessness, teachers receive class lists and students obtain transfers promptly. The painstaking care he demonstrates in all his duties enables the school to maintain organization throughout the year.

Adjusting freshmen to the hectic ways of high school presented the freshman boys' counselor with his first task of the year. The follow-up, enrolling students for their three remaining years at West, came shortly afterwards.

More of the same and additional challenges faced sophomore, junior, and senior counselors. They acquainted transfer students with school life; they untangled enrollment difficulties for boys; and they prepared young men for their futures.

As a confidante, the counselor heard boys' scholastic, financial, and family problems. His objective observation of the situations plus his previous experience in guidance aided the counselor in furnishing welcome recommendations.

Approximately 325 students received instruction from each counselor every week. To explain new regulations, supply immediate answers, and mold strong characters for everyone required almost superhuman interest and patience. When efforts to make the school year successful proved fruitful, members of the Boys' Counseling Department accomplished their aims and felt rewarded.

The study of such well known works as *Julius Caesar*, *Ivanhoe*, *Silas Marner*, and "The Raven," widened students' horizons and enriched their knowledge of the culture that has molded. our lives in the West

Grammar and composition, so often tedious, yet so vital in our relations with others, loom ever more important in the present with the increasing need for men to communicate clearly with each other.

For the first time at Proviso West, the ponderings of ambition driven Macbeth, his unscrupulous wife, and the cackling witches occupied students' thoughts. Proviso's faculty-edited *Handbook of Good Usage* made its debut in September, as did senior term papers later in the year.

As students realized the basic necessity of mastering their own language, the English department - one of our most important - fulfilled its duty.

Sine, tangent, concentric, Pythagorean — these were terms of a new vocabulary that at first puzzled and bewildered Proviso's math students. Many equations later, however, junior-grade mathematicians easily parried these and more difficult terms back and forth over the clatter of chalk and scratching of pencils.

Though all students profited from the diversified curriculum, advanced students derived particular benefits by pursuing courses in calculus, college algebra, trigonometry, and other aspects of higher mathematics. They delved deeper into previously acquired concepts, searching for the "why's" and "how's" of each exercise.

Finding the domain of x and the range of y and sketching loci of sets taught students to analyze problems for themselves. Provisoites grasped the traditional essentials of mathematics through up-to-date learning techniques. On a basis of fundamental assumptions, or properties, students built a system of logic and reason. All classes placed emphasis on mathematical structure rather than on blind application of rule and varied only in level of difficulty. Through this modern comprehensive program, the mathematics department served 1,500 students.





Science Fair Displays Creative Projects

The pungent, obnoxious odor of hydrogen sulfide, the delicate perfection of a monarch butterfly, the crystalline splendor of a geode — these revelations were but a few of the discoveries made by students in Proviso's science department.

Combining superior instruction with exploration in sparkling new laboratories, the science curriculum continued to challenge and stimulate the students. In the laboratory, young Pasteurs, Curies, and Newtons applied the principles and viewed the phenomena that led to some of science's greatest advances. This year a new course made its appearance here. Titled Advanced Biology, it gave interested upperclassmen the opportunity to further their knowledge of the most important of the life sciences.

Colorful wall charts and the slide projector helped provide students with clear pictures of otherwise hard-to-grasp scientific details. Also in use were the latest textbooks, containing authoritative information, which, when coupled with new teaching methods, speeded up scientific learning.

Meeting the great challenges in science today, the science department helped interest students in related careers and emphasized the part science has played in man's story.

Language Studies Accentuate Distant Cultures

The musical tones of Spanish and French and the guttural sounds of German and Russian combined with ancient pronunciations of classical Latin in the language department. This year the department fully inaugurated a new teaching approach, the aural-oral method. By engaging in the lively art of conversation, students perfected their use of modern languages.

Pupils of the eight language teachers could not escape the usual declensions, conjugations, and translations. Clever

skits, college speakers, and bright displays, however, supplemented the usual materials. Tape recordings, films, and slides also enhanced the course of study. Through such modern techniques as the language department had at its disposal, 850 students achieved a greater understanding of their counter-parts in foreign lands.

Just as language itself is an integral part of man's relations with his fellows, the language department occupies such a role in Proviso's curriculum.
