























# Pineapplestems and Senior Class Swing To 'Aloha' Melody








#### Imagination, Music, Decorations Create Memorable Dances









# Interim of Relaxed Conversation Varies Routine of Schedules






### Brief Relaxing and Mad Rushing Pack Six Minute Breaks








#### Bicycling Key Club Leads Santa Claus In Joyous Assembly




#### Exams Bring Tension and Hectic Study Hours with Completion of Semester


### Loyalty Committee Spurs Enthusiastic 'Kemo Sabe' Cheer

#### Keck Haunts West At Annual Variety Show Performance In February, Mrs. Karen Rosenblate's crew

















### A Woodland Scene Develops Romantic Prom Atmosphere

### Arrow Turns from '63 to '64 at Annual Class Night Rituals



### June 12th Heralds 640 Red-Clad Seniors at 3rd Commencement Exercise



### Ceramic, Metal Art Work Reveal Creative Abilities In Contemporary Designs

The art department induced individual appreciation and expression in the fine and applied arts. Courses in art first introduced the basic fundamentals of lettering, simple design, color schemes, drawing, and painting. Advanced students employed these rudimental techniques in a more complicated manner. Correct proportion and shading became indispensable knacks in the use of chalk, paint, and charcoal. Pencil sketches, good composition, and final oil paintings of a treescape or a profile on canvas were end products which gave great satisfaction. Those who preferred crafts used their abilities to combine abstract ideas with material forms. Wood, clay, plastics, and metals were transformed into modern and classical shapes. Proper illustrations had meaning for artists interested in commercial application. Accurate lettering and styled layouts were adopted for problems similar to those of magazine and newspaper advertising. With no prerequisites, any student could gain a knowledge of the value of great painting, music, architecture, and sculpture through the study of humanities.

A different outlook in business education appeared in the commercial department this year. The growing diversified occupations division stressed active participation in business situations. The organizations sponsoring diversified occupations members included chemical laboratories, department stores, meat packaging plants, and grocery stores. Under the guidance of trained people representing these companies, participants received vocational instruction helpful to successful futures. The older division of the department is situated on the third floors of buildings C and D where the

pounding keys and clanging bells resounded from typing classes. In addition to Type I and II, girls and boys participating in secretarial curricula selected a wide range of courses which might include shorthand, general business, commercial law, and money management. Salesmanship and retailing brought people into the study of the business world. A proficiency in operating and understanding the complex equipment used today was gained in office and calculating machines. Office practice gave seniors a comprehensive review of secretarial skills for clerical and secretarial positions.



### Students Visit Vocational Guidance Center About College, Career Choices

The counselors at Proviso West spent the school year helping students with school activities as well as with their personal problems. The first undertaking was the orientation of new students. Helping transfer students and freshmen become accustomed to school life at West was a major task handled by the nine members on the staff. Scrambled schedules and class transfers were all untangled in their busy offices during the first two weeks of school. The counselors also helped students choose academic courses and count credits needed for graduation and as pre-requisites for colleges and careers. The new Vocational Guidance Center in C-114 aided students planning the years after graduation. Pre-college Night in the fall and College Day in the spring were sponsored by the counselors to inform college bound students about the schools of their choice and to help the undecided student choose a college best suited to his needs. Students planning to work after graduation or to attend trade schools also received help from the vocational counselor. Family, social, and financial problems of the students received attention from the counselors. Students revealed their problems in confidence, and the counselors rendered valuable advice which helped students emotionally and scholastically.



Shakespearean Tragedies Illustrate Intricacies of Classic Drama to Seniors

Investigating all phases of his language, each student of the English department studied the basics of grammar and analyzed literature of all periods. Run-on sentence, comma splice, double negative—these were terms familiar to all freshmen as they became further acquainted with the complexities of sentence structure and good usage. Further emphasis on grammar and a broad survey of literature was the program for the sophomore English classes. Equipped with this basic knowledge, the junior had an opportunity to enroll in more intensive, specialized courses. For the student interested in speech, dramatics and public speaking combined the theories of effective presentation with practical experience as the pupil exhibited his new-found skill before his classmates in monologues, demonstration speeches, and a final play. Aspiring authors enrolled in either creative writing or newswriting. Here the student gained insight into creative and factual writing methods. Future secretaries learned secrets of business success from how to punctuate a complicated sentence to how to select the proper word in secretarial English. American literature increased student knowledge of our country's heritage. With this background, the senior studied English literature more extensively. He searched for symbolism and critically analyzed what he read. An extensive grammar review was also an important part of any senior English class as the student prepared himself for the communications skill so vital in either college or the business world. Constantly expanding and initiating new methods of instruction, the department chose selected classes to work with "English 2600," an experimental program of teaching and learning, while greater acceleration and depth were introduced in many advanced English courses.





### Gírls Assimilate Practical Cooking Rules in West's Modern Food Laboratory

Stay stiching, French knives, cool or warm colors, and expenditures were terms familiar to girls participating in the home economics department. Four phases of the department administered the arts of homemaking. The two-year advancement programs of Foods I and II and Clothing I and II built upon and extended previous knowledge and skills. The familiarity with nutrition, menu preparation, cooking arts, and attractive service gained in Foods I served as a foundation for later laboratory work and dietary theories taught in Foods II. The first year clothing student became acquainted with the seemingly infinite number of stitches and sewing terms. Coupled with these were laboratory experiences in basic clothing construction. Clothing II extended acquired talents by application to more complicated garments and baby clothes. Family Living investigated the problems of young married couples and a day's discussion in this class might center around a smoothly run budget or a contented baby. Completing the home economics department was the second one-semester course, Home Decorating. This subject emphasized the importance of applying eye-appealing color combinations to harmonizing interior decoration.

### Junior Apprentices Learn Primary Industrial Crafts From Specialized Courses

Providing future mechanics, woodcraftsmen, machinists, and architects with the tools necessary for their proper training has been the main goal of the industrial arts department. Power-driven equipment and precision machinery of all types were available to students interested in metalworking and woodworking. Those who devoted their time to auto mechanics found that the auto shop provided excellent experience; printers also had the essential devices to develop their skills. With these extraordinary facilities and a well developed program of diversified occupation in auto mechanics, machine shop, and printing, the department staff successfully prepared students for their desired vocation. Sophomores, juniors, and seniors could receive basic and specialized schooling in the growing applications of electricity, but perhaps most important was the art of drawing. Proficient use of a T square and compass was the secret to mastery of the "language of industry." From the varied courses offered by the industrial arts department, students gained a thorough understanding of the theory, design, and mechanics in manufacture and usage of industrial products. Besides the basis for careers, acquired techniques and craftsmanship furnished each participant the beginning of a pleasurable hobby and useful abilities for later life.





Deutsche Studenten, like all others taking a foreign language, began by learning the basic concepts in the formation of new rules. The sometimes-simple alphabet usually headed this list. Counting was perhaps the next object of consideration as voices drilled eins, zwei, drei, vier . . zweiundsiebzigtausanddreihundertvierundsechniz in front of blurring pages. Hours of effort went into memorizing new vocabularies, irregular verb endings, correct word order, and indefinite articles. En français le garcon was masculine, la jeune fille was feminine, but what was the reasoning behind la fenetre, a feminine window? For this the romantic Frenchman had no satisfactory answer. Along with infinite lists of prepositions and noun declensions in the grammatical picture were demonstrative pronouns. Is, ea, id, ejus..., the many words for "this" in Latin, required dedicated concentration until complete familiarity was secondhand. Good writing also required proficiency in the mechanics of punctuation, perhaps most pronounced in Spanish. ¿ Porque no nada? i No nada nada porque no traje! The medal of honor for reproducing script, however, justly went to Russian students. Wading through Madame Therese, Doctor Faustus, Caesar's Gallic Wars, and Heroes of Our Time promoted better reading and translation of foreign literature while charlas improved aural comprehension and good pronunciation. Language studies which included history and geography awarded an educational view of the heritage, culture, and manners of other peoples.

### Basic Number Concepts Precede Logical Thinking In Mathematics Courses

The importance of mathematics in scientific and humanistic education has made it a vital part of everyone's curriculum and a highly respected academic department. Starting with the basic idea of the number line, algebra formed the ground work for mathematics which followed arithmetic. Essential concepts of associativity, closure, and prime factors brought the picture of number structure and behavior into focus with the many systems and operations. The geometric realm of space and plane improved appreciation of the arts in daily life and of the necessity for logical reasoning. Understanding relationships of polygons and congruent triangles, drove confused minds to deduce thoughtful conclusions from postulates and theorems in infinite proofs. Trigonometry, the world of the right triangle, went beyond radian measure and fundamental identities to cologarithms and inverse functions. Advanced algebra and DeMoivre's Theorem became almost synonymous in the untangling of imaginary numbers while applying the theory of chance and the drawing of sections furnished amusing pastimes. Only a selected few analyzed end-point extrema and linear differential equations in calculus, but whether one's studies led through regular or college preparatory courses, the developed ability of rigorous thinking sent students deeper into the meaning and use of mathematics.




The cone provides the basis for series of geometric shapes.





Microfilm took the place of old magazines to make way for the more recent periodicals. The enlarged south library fiction section and the annextion of an extra room, B-202, helped keep the library up-to-date. New assistants and slender library pages, who kept in condition by hunting for study halls and delivering slips, were employed to help with the great deal of work. Buying, processing, shelving, and repairing books were important tasks in maintaining an efficiently-run library for everyone's use.

The faculty and administration also relied upon the trusted advice and care of these women who gave a series of preventive flu shots. Together the nurses strived for a healthier student body and faculty.

### Varied Physical Program Combines Athletic Skills And Practical Techniques

The whack of a tennis racket, the splash of a swimmer's stroke, the impact of a volleyball serve - these sounds announced the girls' physical education department in action. While the conditioning of a sound body remained the department's primary goal, girls also learned how to parallel park in driver education, to set a splint in first aid, and to properly care for the body in health and hygiene classes. Whether creating pungent odors in the chemistry lab or enthusiastically immersing various species in preservatives, students of science plunged into nature's wonders and mysteries. Freshmen began with general science, an extensive

study of the familiar phases of physical and earth science,

and had the opportunity to further their knowledge by one of a series of other courses offered by the science department. In Biology I insect collections and broken microscope slides were as unavoidable as the dissections and field trips for an understanding of the chemical-physical life processes of plants and animals. Advanced work in Biology II refined

basic concepts and developed a broader appreciation by research and experimentation. Rock and soil analysis illus-

trated earth features for geology students who probed the oldest written history of the world. Titration, oxidation, and condensation enabled junior chemists to obtain accurate data in experiments to understand the properties and forms

of matter. The phenomena of electricity, light, sound, and heat provided the topics of discussion in physics classes where the language of mathematics played the important

role of explaining technical theories and laws.

The social studies department presented man and his world as the history, customs, and practices of people. The United States and foreign countries were reviewed in a panoramic and analytic exposition. Ancient European civilizations, the rule of the Manchu Dynasty, and the conquests of Jose de San Martin became monuments in the past and serious points of interest for classroom instruction. With the opportunity of self-expression in debate, reports, and informal discussion, everyone could voice his opinions while probing the causes and effects of the historical facts. Environmental factors of physical resources, climate, and distribution of animal life; economic principles of industry, trade, taxes, and banking; and political practices of local and international government fostered a firm background for interpreting current news. The social studies department, in offering the student comprehensive and stimulating courses, aided the student to discover the meaning of past and present.

### New Department Branch Serves as Special Clinic To Aid in Braille Reading

The word "braille" gained deeper meaning for Proviso students with the advent of a new clinic developed specifically for blind students as a branch of West's department of special education. Here, with the aid of braille typewriters, a growing braille library, and devoted instruction, blind students had an opportunity to explore the world of learning along with their sighted friends. The speech clinic, also a part of special education, helped those students with speaking defects and reading deficiencies. Tape recorders, charts, hours of careful study and practice culminated successfully as the student gained new abilities in verbally conveying his thought and gaining greater confidence in conversation. The average pupil, particularly those who were collegebound, also had a place in the special education program. Realizing the need for quick, yet comprehensive reading ability, the clinic encouraged students to take advantage of its speed-reading course. Using special equipment and following definite steps, the student gradually built up his reading scores, constantly spurred by frequent testing of his progress. With a staff of three, the department of special education served the individual person. Encouraging their students to rely upon themselves as well as the clinic, these educators worked for the further development of abilities and knowledge that would enable the student to better cope with his surroundings.

The success of the many school activities was partly due to the crew of twenty-seven maintenance men. They helped coaches by caring for equipment and setting up the game fields. Students who could not arrange heavy scenery or mount sixty foot ladders to pin streamers from the gym ceiling obtained assistance from the custodians, on duty around the clock. The Homecoming game left a mass of streamers and tattered decorations, but by the time of the dance the grounds were cleared for the students. After student events maintenance men took over and cleared the building for the next school day. On blustery winter mornings students and

faculty arrived to snow cleared driveways and parking lots. On such mornings the men in charge of West's complex heating units successfully maintained a comfortable seventy-three degree temperature throughout the building. The appearance of the building and grounds has also been the responsibility of these men. This area of work included washing thousands of windows and cutting acres of grass. Every day after school they swept floors, dusted desks, emptied waste paper baskets and made numerous repairs necessary for a well kept building.

Hot beef sandwiches, spaghetti, banana cream pie, and hot fudge sundaes entreated appetites that calorie conscious girls fought while boys splurged with an extra turkey dinner. The twenty-six member cafeteria staff headed by their dietician Mrs. Dorothy Accardi tackled the job of satisfying the healthy appetites of West's hungry teenagers. After devising a varied menu for every day school was in session, the cafeteria staff prepared and served gallons of steaming soup, and dozens of hamburgers and hot dogs that Proviso West students consumed in addition to the forty cent hot lunches. These women also deserved much credit for preparing the eye-appealing array of pies, cakes, puddings, and jello that tempted hungry students thrived on. For many members of the staff the day ended after hundreds of place settings had been cleared and washed. These women often supervised food preparation for organizational banquets and other activities requiring cafeteria service. After the last person had gone home and the lights were out, a spotless cafeteria and kitchen remained to beckon the hoards of hungry people.












### Usherettes Display Poise And Politeness at Annual Proviso West Open House










### "West on Exhibit" Strives To Portray the Activities Of Proviso Student Body















#### December "Water Week" Features Panther Relays








#### Players Vote Wittersheim Most Valuable; Complete Season with 5-2-1 Record







The Proviso West varsity mermen, under Coach Walt Cryer, came up with one of the best performances in the school's history as they finished the season on top of the Interim League. The wetbacks met defeat only once during the season, a 73-22 setback at the hands of mighty Hinsdale. During the season, every school record in the books except one was broken or tied. Junior distance swimmer Paul Kobierski broke records in the 200- and 400-yard freestyle. Sprinter Frank Novak, another junior, established the standard in the 50-yard freestyle. For his excellence throughout the season, Clark Van Cleave was chosen as the Most Valuable Senior. The Cats took first place in the Panther Relays and first in the Riverside-Brookfield Invitations, upsetting both R-B and Proviso East. 




## Cagers Claim Title of Best Yet at West After Posting of 9-12 Record










## Gymnastics Squad Built Through Long Practice Surprises Most Experts










