






In Step With the Homecoming Game














Halloween Happenings

Nearly thirty years ago, the race to the moon began, when the Soviets launched a dog into space. And, President Dwight D. Eisenhower was serving his second term with Richard M. Nixon as Vice President. On the entertainment scene, moviegoers were treated to a new dimension in cinematography enjoyment when Polaroid glasses were introduced at 3-D movies. Anthony Perkins terrified audiences with the original *Psycho*. On stage, Julie Andrews and Rex Harrison delighted audiences in My Fair Lady. When teenagers were not busy cramming into telephone booths, they were endorsing the Hula-Hoop craze. Songs like "Tequila" by the Champs and "All I Have To Do Is Dream" by the Everly Brothers were at the top of the dance charts. Also, in September of 1958, Proviso West High School opened for its first session. Some of the original faculty members are still teaching at Proviso. They are dedicated to teaching. Along with using textbooks, they relate knowledge that they have acquired from years of experience and from students, interchageably, in teaching. This continual trade and application of ideas is the endless cycle of knowledge.



our school to be a really good school, we need to have students serious about education and are proud of their school. Parents must be interested and involved, because it would be a catastrophe to see opportunity wasted."










He enjoys seeing people develop a skill that they can use later in life. He tells all of his students to make sure that they turn in all their assignments on time and correctly. He began teaching because many of his friends did.

He sees today's students as passive. They are no longer interested in learning, but they just want to pass. He sees less school spirit among the students. He believes that parents should demand better grades from their children.


Mr. Lawrence Stilwell feels his 30 years at Proviso have gone by fast. The first year seems like yesterday to him. He teaches World Civilizations and U.S. History and he attempts to challenge students to reflect upon the important things in life. He does not warn his students about anything. He just tries to motivate them to get a good start.

He enjoys teaching, and nothing has come along to change his mind. Among his favorite moments are the four times he shared the glory of a state championship with his chess team. He believes people are people, whether 30 years ago or today. He would like to see more teacher power and student power being used to creatively solve problems, increase involvement, and enjoy experiences.

He sees that increased involvement and commitment is needed for Proviso to have a better future. "Students who build their lives on eternal values will have a better future."

Mr. Glenn Rittmueller is the chairman of the English Department. He teaches senior English Academics with Mrs. Holt, and enjoys the intervention with students. He believes that all students must bridge the gap between their work and their potential. He began teaching because he always enjoyed school and people.

He feels that the rules that used to restrict the students are now more lenient. "Before, students were seldomly allowed to be in the hallways while classes were in session. Today the emphasis is less on education." He says that the school would improve if students felt that their families and school were more important than jobs, cars, and clothes. Also, he feels that it would be better if attitudes toward school and people were like they were about twenty years ago. Sometimes it is better to look back for reassurance so we can be strong in the present.





Mr. Robert Gusloff feels that his thirty years at Proviso have been a long time with a lot of changes. He is the dean of the senior class. One of the most memorable times here was during the Democratic Presidential Convention because some students were involved in demonstrations. He was appreciative that he had a chance to work with students and try to better human relations. Because of new economic needs, parents have to work. Parents now receive pre-recorded messages instead of personal notification when the student is absent. For the future, he hopes that there will be more involvement from school administrators and parents with the community.


Seniors Say Goodbye



Aside from the college-prep courses, Proviso West offers courses that allow students to work with their hands while also preparing themselves for the working world.



Physical Education is necessary for a student's mental and physical health. Besides relieving stress through competition, gym at Proviso is a time for cooperation and relaxation.




An Up And Down Season

Taking the Plunge


