As sophomores, we entered Proviso West with a slightly different attitude. The

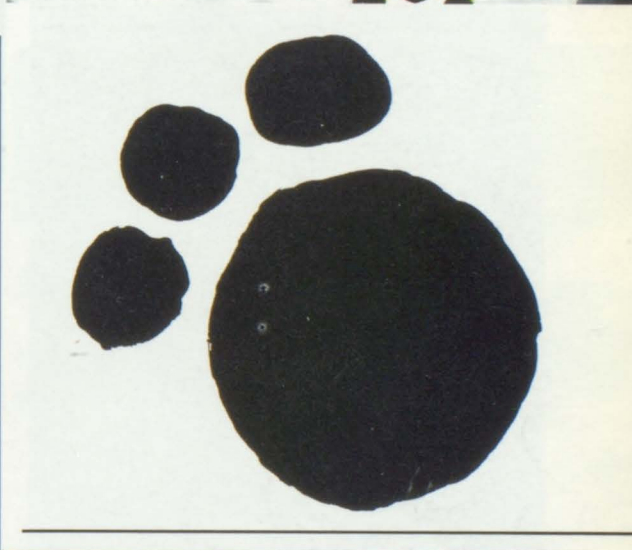
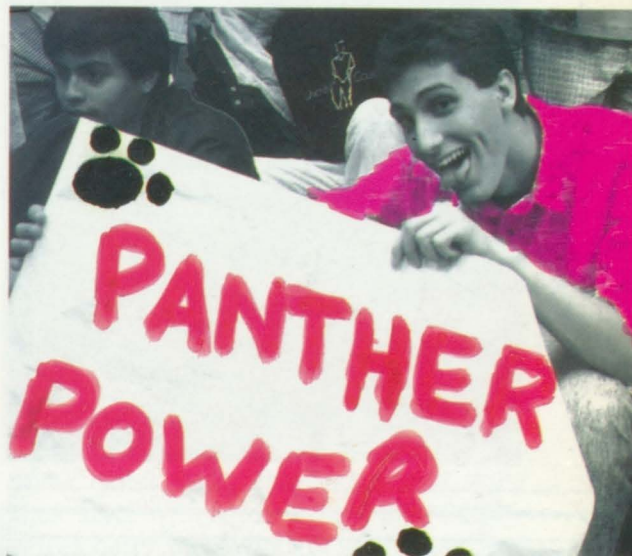

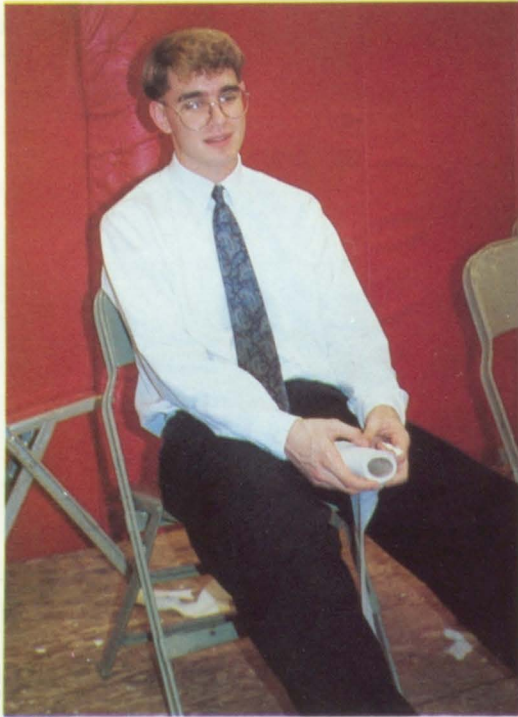
The Pep Assembly

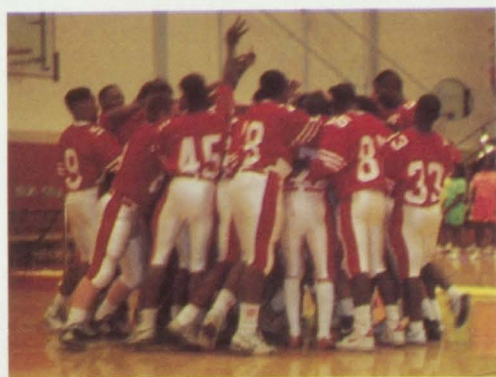
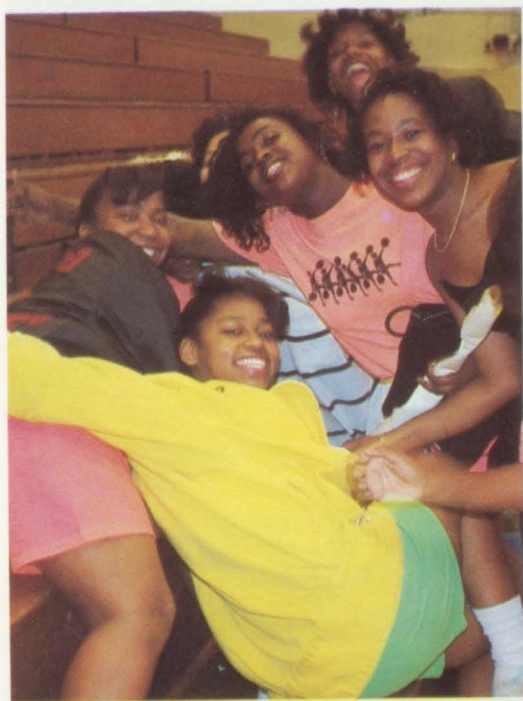
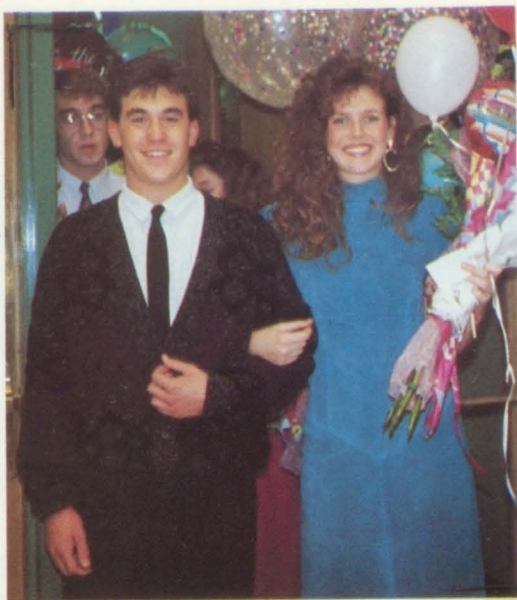

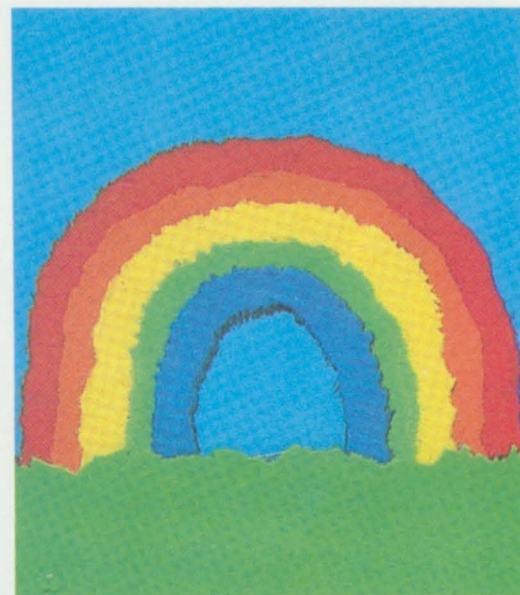

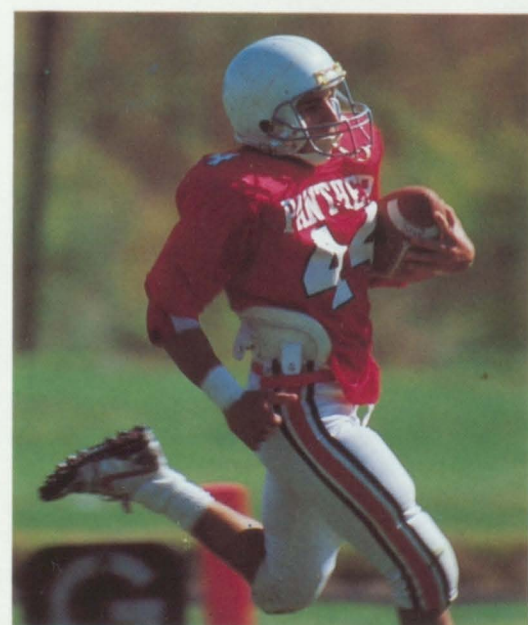
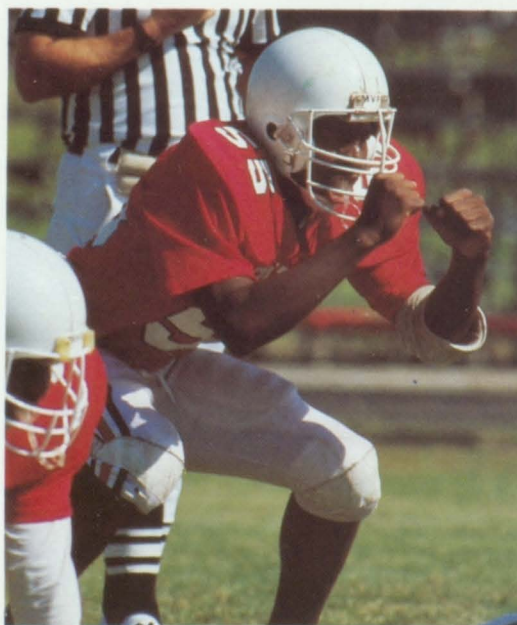
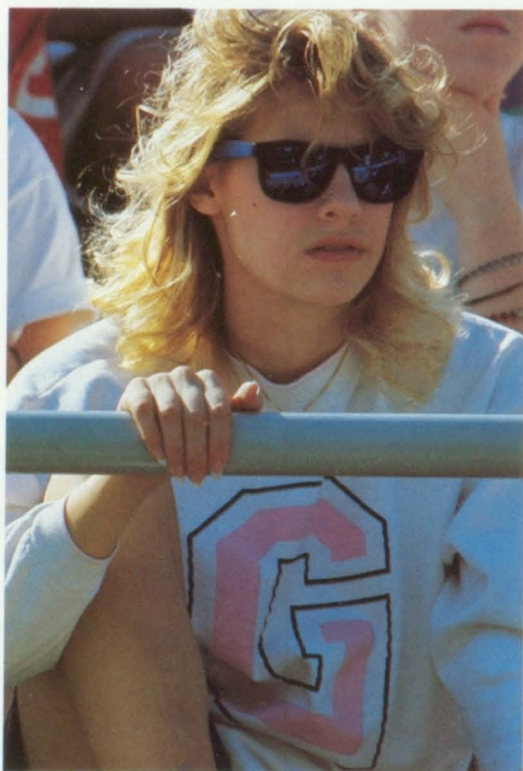
Homecoming Game

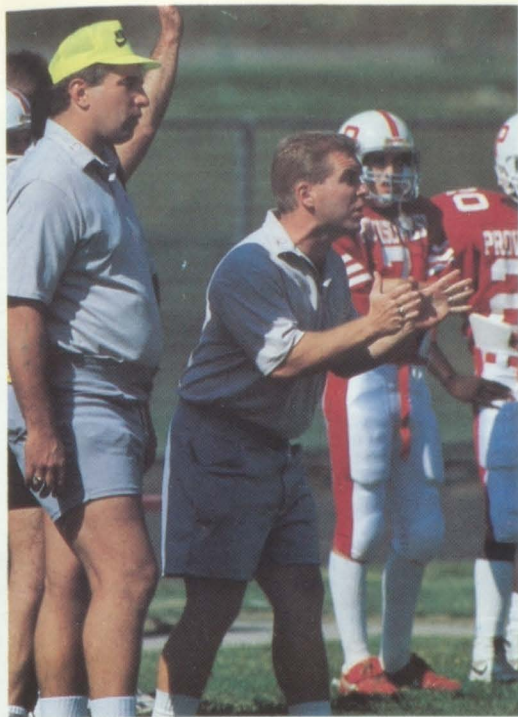

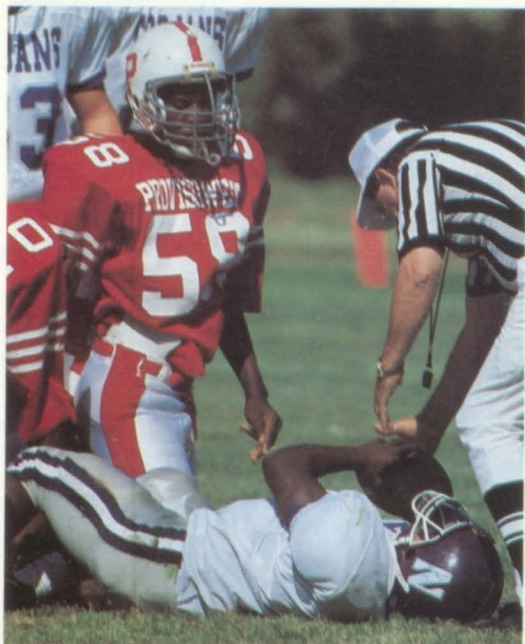
Dancing into Oz

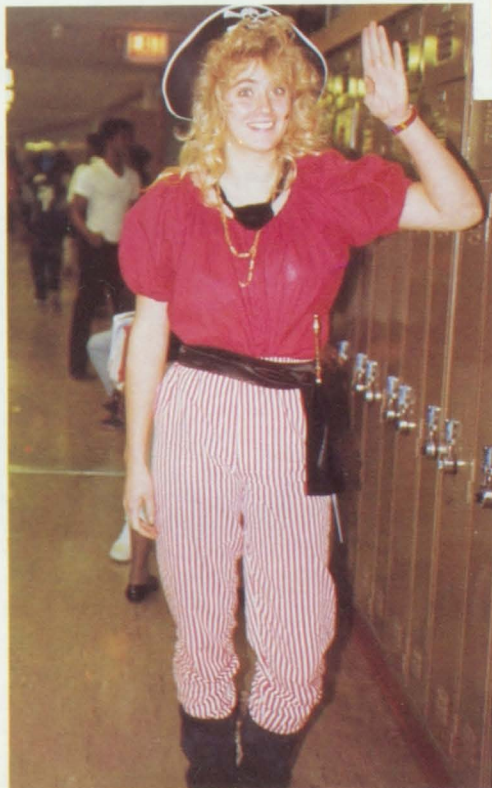

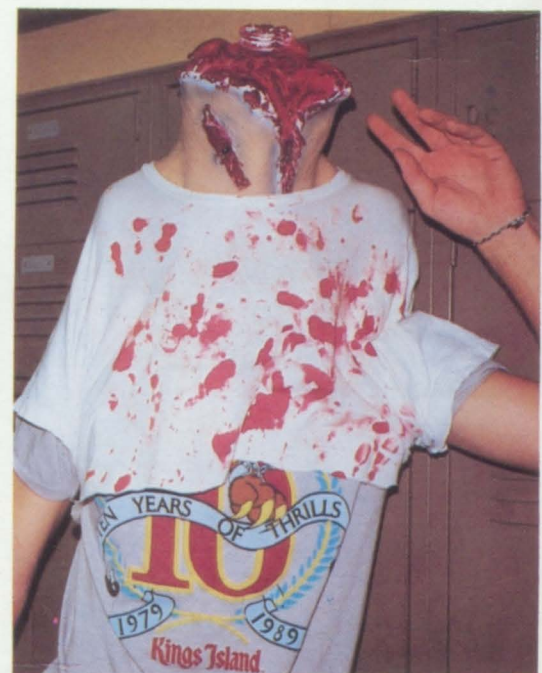
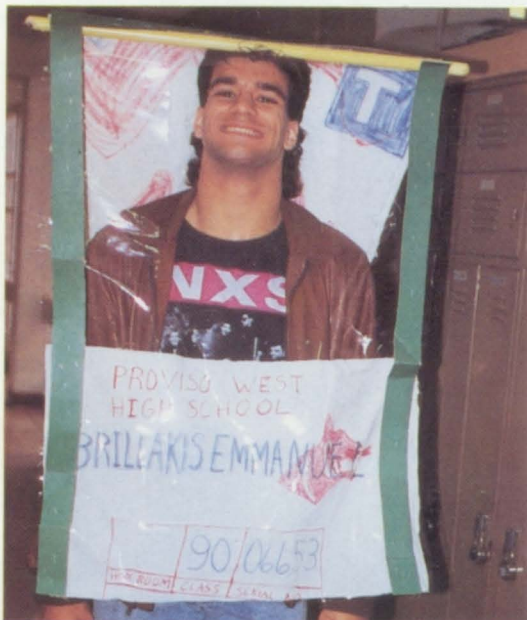


Freaky Tuesday

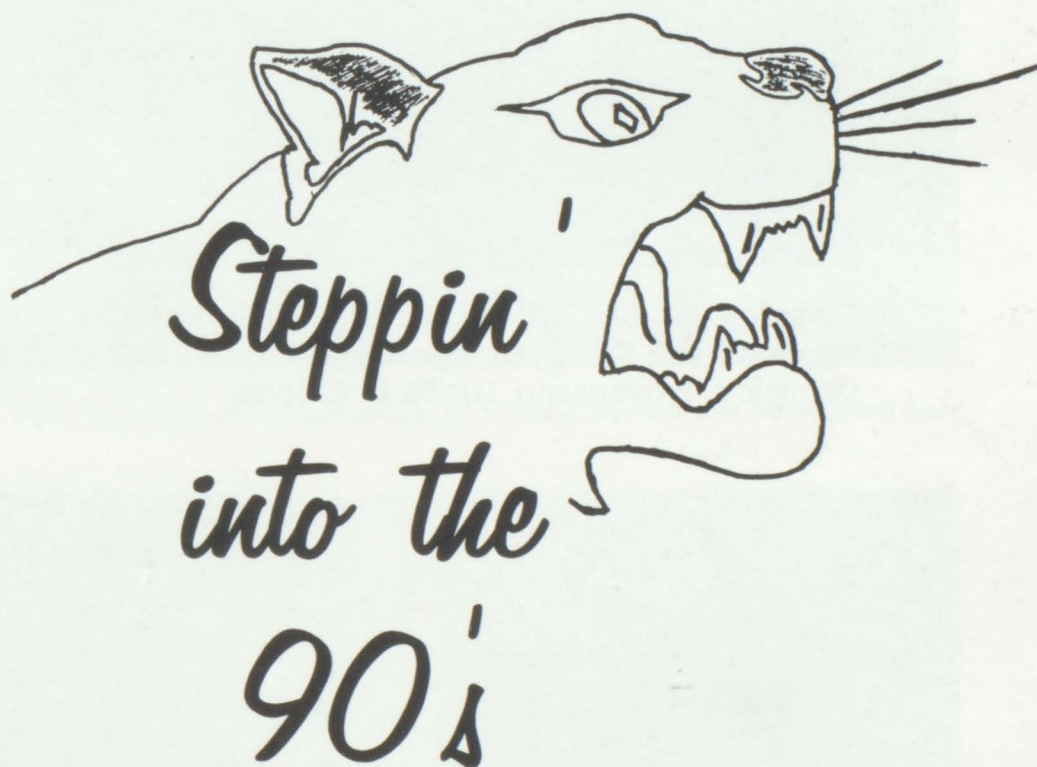

Proviso Says Good-Bye

The years to come will bring all of us many memories of the 1989-90 school year. But memories are made up not only of the good times and enjoyable experiences but also of unpleasant and painful occasions.

Richard F. Gusloff, Assistant Principal, passed away suddenly and without warning on January 22, 1990. With his passing, Proviso West lost a friend, teacher and administrator who devoted thirty-three years to the service of Proviso West community, staff and student body.

Mr. Gusloff, known to many of us as "Gus", is my personal loss of a colleague, acquaintance, and loyal administrator. It has been my privilege to know and work with Gus since my appointment as Assistant Principal in 1968.

Those many years presented us at West with good times but also with trying times. In his congenial and comforting manner, Gus always managed to make a difficult situation or problem less stressful.

For the past ten years, we met at 7 a. m. to discuss problems and plans for that day's events. At our weekly administrators'

meetings, his counsel and opinion were respected by all of us. There were times when we did not agree, but Gus' judgments and decisions were always based on sound considerations. He was truly an experienced and professional administrator in every sense of the word.

In dealing with students, Gus brought a unique philosophy to my administrative staff. He was a man of vision and determination who truly loved kids—all kids, regardless of race or color. When a student was sent to his office for a disciplinary infraction, his last resort was to remove that student from school. His total energies were devoted to keeping students in school by changing those undesirable attitudes and molding them into acceptable behavior. Such was his way—this man of determination.

Yes, Gus has been missed and will be missed for many years to come. But he will not be forgotten for he touched many, many lives. His presence may be lost but I'm sure that his influence will help to make this world a better place in which to live, a little more interesting, and a lot more fun.

Richard Gusloff spent extra time as a church Sunday School organizer. Gusloff gave time to his community through his religious activity. He took pride in all of his work and an even deeper pride in his family. His wife, three children and five grandchildren were a very important factor in his life. Mr. Gusloff came to Proviso thirty

two years ago as a special education teacher at East. He moved to West in 1958 when it opened. He became a counselor, and then was appointed assistant principal in 1967. Mr. Gusloff was a qualified administrator and loving family man.

Mr. G. will be missed in the hearts of Proviso West. His sense of humor, charisma, and radiant smile will live in everyone here forever. Gusloff was a man that was a hero to all students because of his many accomplishments and achievements. As Emily Dickson said, "Because I could not stop for death, death kindly stopped for me." Richard Gusloff stayed busy as he planned to retire at the end of the year, but his death kindly stopped for him instead. Mourning the death of an administrator, teacher, and friend, makes one realize and respect the greatness of this man. He has retired in the Lord's arms receiving gifts for his unselfishness and care he gave Proviso for so many years. We will always remember and love Mr. Gusloff for completing the great memories of Proviso West.

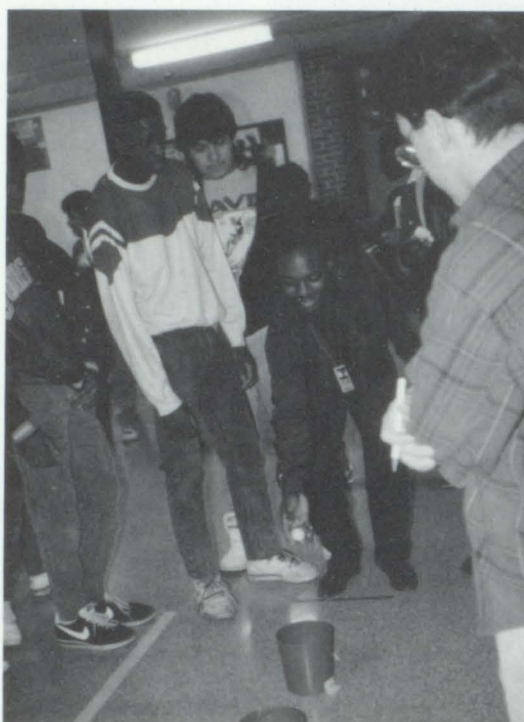

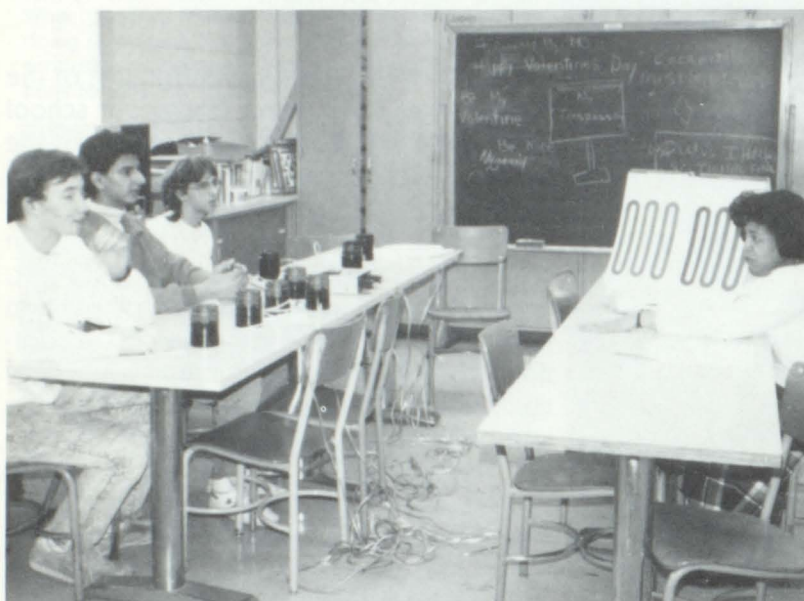

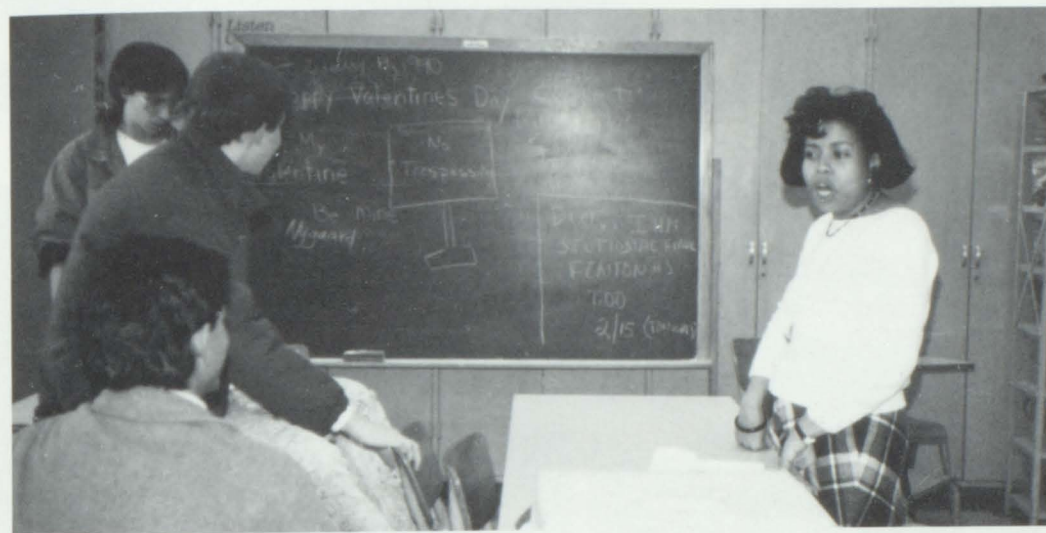
Combining Thinking and Fun

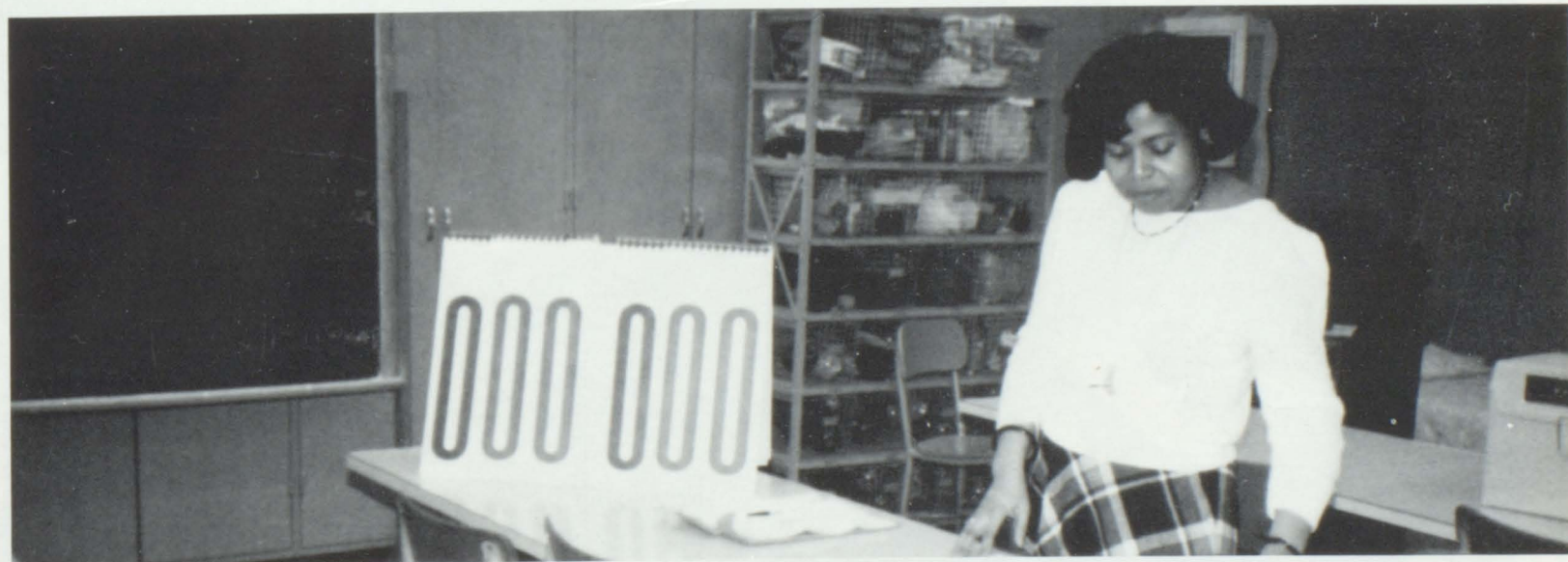

Black Students Make A Choice

Why Did You Choose To Attend A Black University?

An extremely popular question that has come up with many black seniors at Proviso West is, "Why do you want to attend a black university?" In order to see if there was a logical answer to this question, the yearbook staff conducted a survey of a few seniors who were definitely enrolling in an all black university. Of the five seniors; Symentra Matthews, Kimberly Magee, Iris Hawkins, Kathy Morris, and Kenneth Buford there were several answers. Of all of the replies we managed to narrow it down to the eight most common points:

- 1) The experience of viewing the lifestyles of people of their same race.
- 2) Preparing for competition when applying for a job.
- 3) Growing academically and personally.
- 4) Developing to their fullest potential.
- 5) Learning about the African past and cultural fulfillment.

- 6) Having Blacks in administration.
- 7) Having black teachers.
- 8) The advantage of having more black role models.

Some people are scared to go to a black college because they think that they are expected to practice African beliefs. Black universities only want you to believe in yourself and everyone that doubted that you can succeed no matter what racial barriers that you face. Now don't get the wrong idea, black colleges want you to excel academically yet they also have a wide range of social, recreational, and cultural activities. At Morehouse College, for instance, they have more than forty student organizations, five honor societies, five Greek fraternities and several student publications. Howard University has more than two dozen national honor societies including Phi Beta Kappa, the Honors Program, a student exchange program and an active student gov-

ernment. Spelman College in Atlanta, Georgia encourages their students to, "think critically, logically, and creatively; to develop competence in decision-making and problem-solving, and to improve their use of communicative and quantitative skills." The academic program prepares students for competition with graduates of their institutions. "Spelman has been and expects to continue to be a major resource for educating black women leaders." "We (at Morehouse) encourage students to be active participants in their own education. This overall focus on the development of the whole student is why our graduates consistently achieve prominence as influential leaders, in arenas great and small." The purpose of black universities extends beyond intellectual development and professional career preparation of students. It seeks to develop the total person.

Sharing Feelings

T. N. T. may sound like a new club this year, but it is actually a re-naming of an existing group. Many students know this group as the Rap Groups. This club gives students a chance to discuss topics of interest to *them*. Guided by teachers, these groups meet during lunch study periods and focus on concerns inside and outside of school. The students can bring up topics for discussion, or the teacher can provide the structure for the day.

Many students enjoy this club, because it gives them the chance to explore their feelings in a non-threatening environment. The trust that grows between the students is important because of the sensitive nature of some of the ideas shared. The building of trust and the ability to share honestly are parts of the "lessons" learned in the group. The students must honor each others' privacy, and must hold in confidence those things that students say.

This gives students a chance to be heard. Sometimes parents and teachers who want to be available for discussion do not make the time for the teen. Just knowing that there is someone who will listen and help students sort out feelings, often makes the transition period of high school easier. This group meets once during each week, during the lunch study periods. The teachers that volunteer their time and listening skills should be commended. They help to foster good decision-making skills and challenge the students to develop attitudes and opinions about things around them.

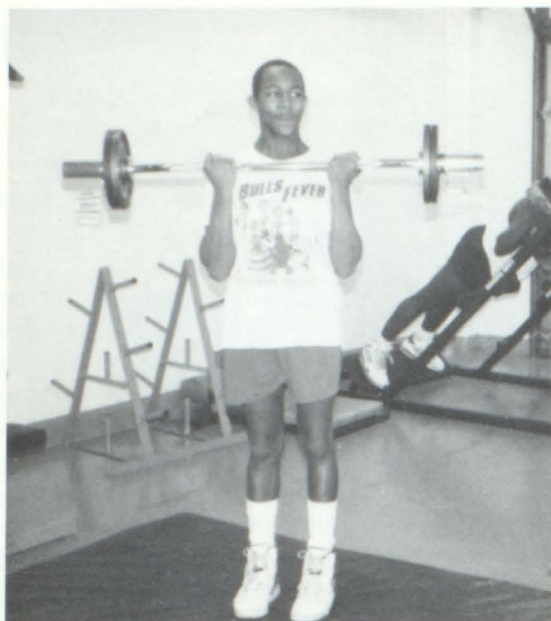

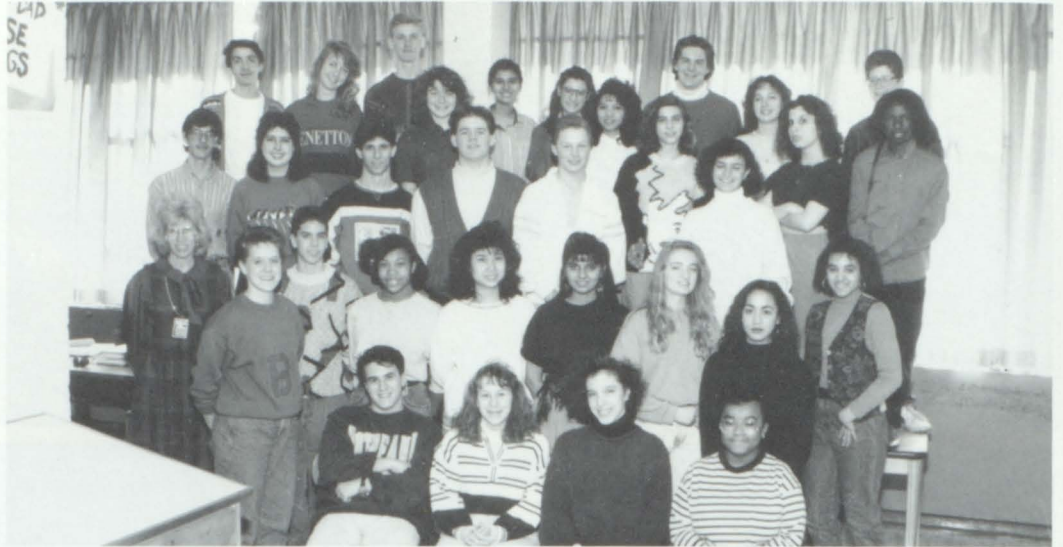
Learning journalism at its best

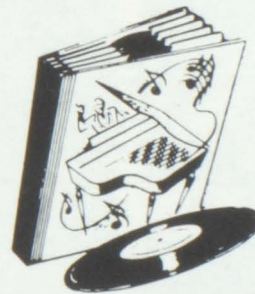

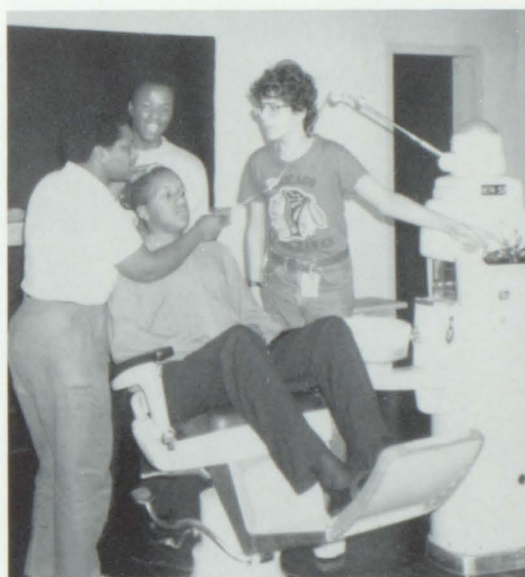

"Practice like a champion, play like a champion." According to Mr. McAlpin, head coach of the varsity team, these are words to live by. "It's really up to the team to practice hard and play hard because I can't always be there to push them to do their best," Mr. McAlpin states. After last year's first place tie with three other teams in the conference, the Panthers expected to do just as well this year, with thirteen returning players. Unfortunately, due to unexpected injuries to Tim Silkaitis (starting pitcher), and Ruben Hinojosa (starting shortstop), the Panthers finished fourth in the conference with a record of 12:21.

Even though our team didn't do as well as expected, three leaders had outstanding seasons. Chris Welch, Tim Silkaitis, and Renaldo Bullock broke nine season and career records. Renaldo, starting center fielder, scored forty runs in the season. This broke the previous record of thirty-five runs per

season. He also beat the record for most stolen bases in a season by stealing thirty-two. Tim Silkaitis, starting third baseman, crushed the homerun record by hitting seven, and he holds the record for forty-six RBI's in a single season. He challenged two career records too. He now holds the career record for RBI's, with eighty-two, and tied the record for career home runs, with eight. Chris Welch, a three-year starter, broke three career records. He holds the records for career base hits, with one hundred thirteen, career runs scored, with eighty, and career stolen bases with fifty-four.

As expected, these three outstanding players received All-Conference honors. The MVP award was given to Tim Silkaitis. According to junior Steve Miller, "Even though our record was not as good as it could have been, I feel that our team showed a lot of determination and hard work. I look forward to a great season next year."

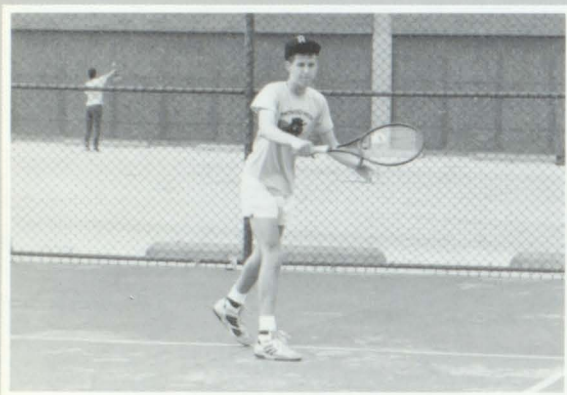

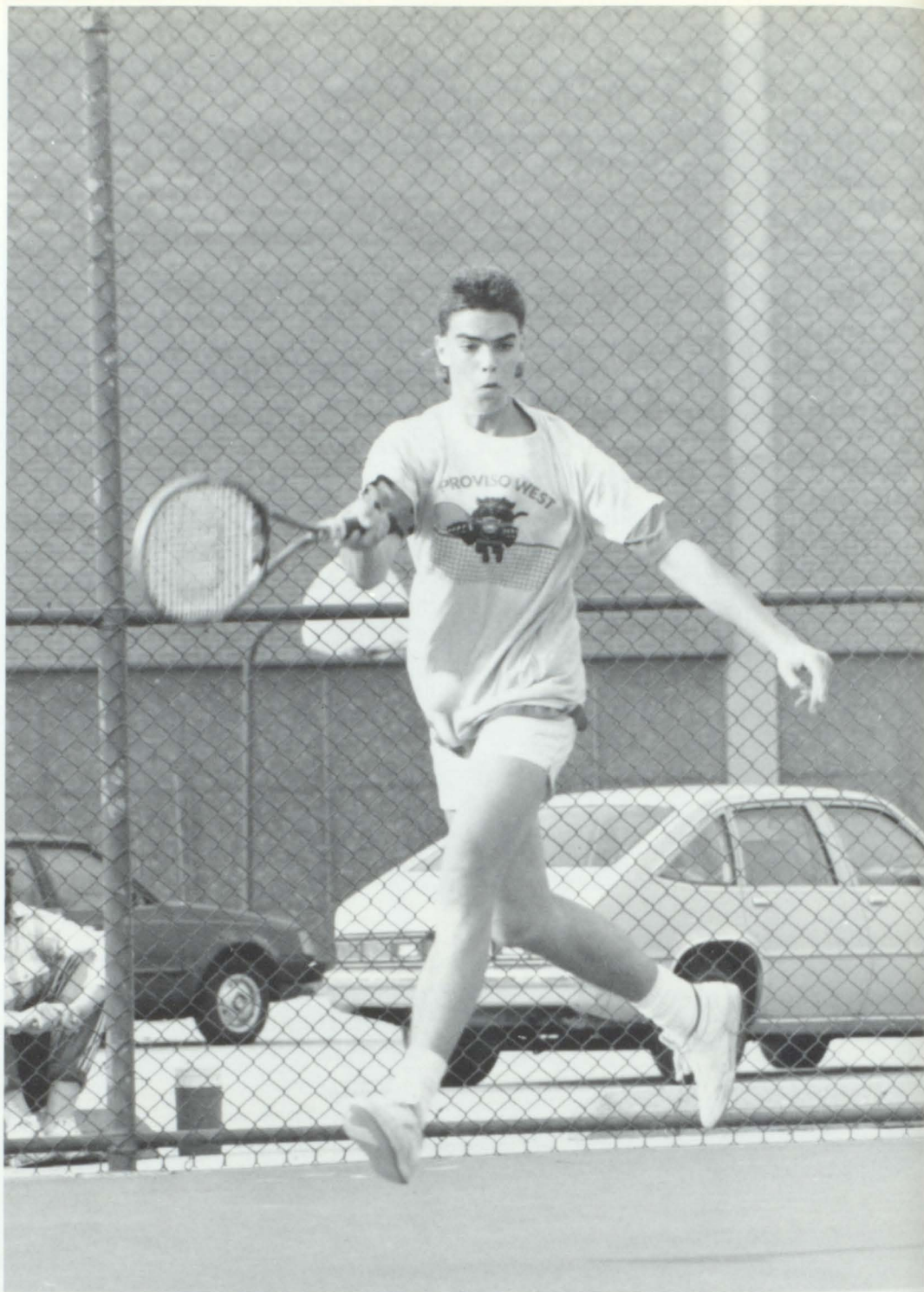

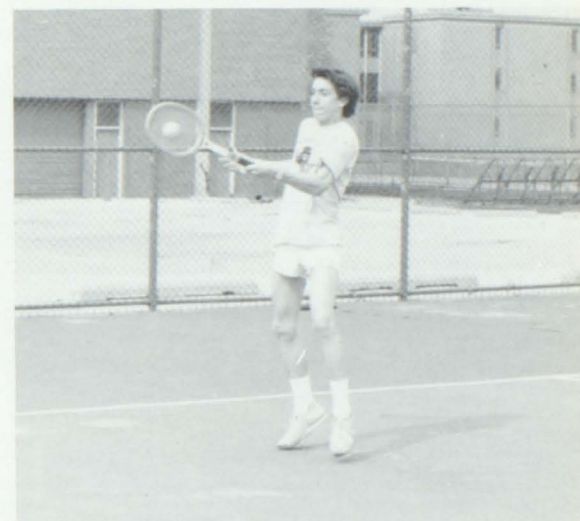
SWINGIN' into the 90's

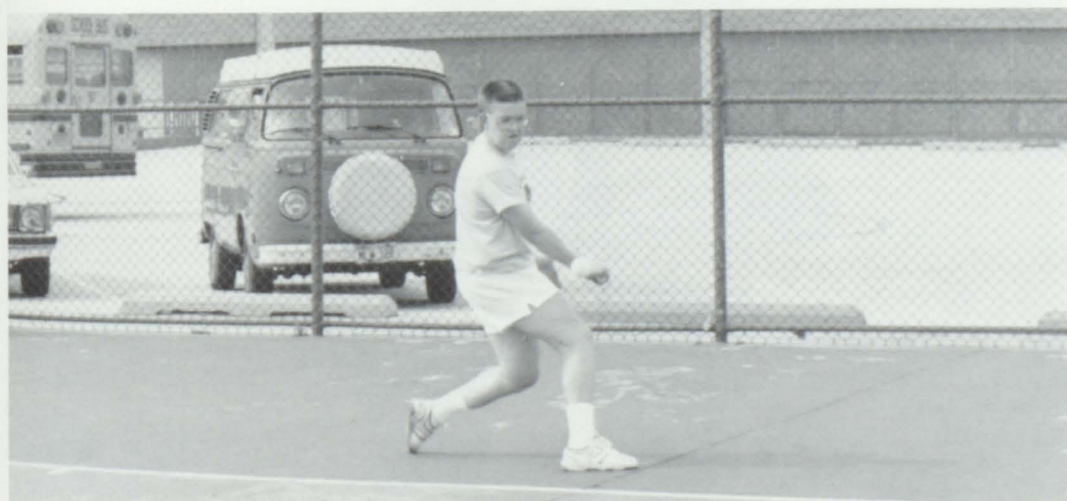
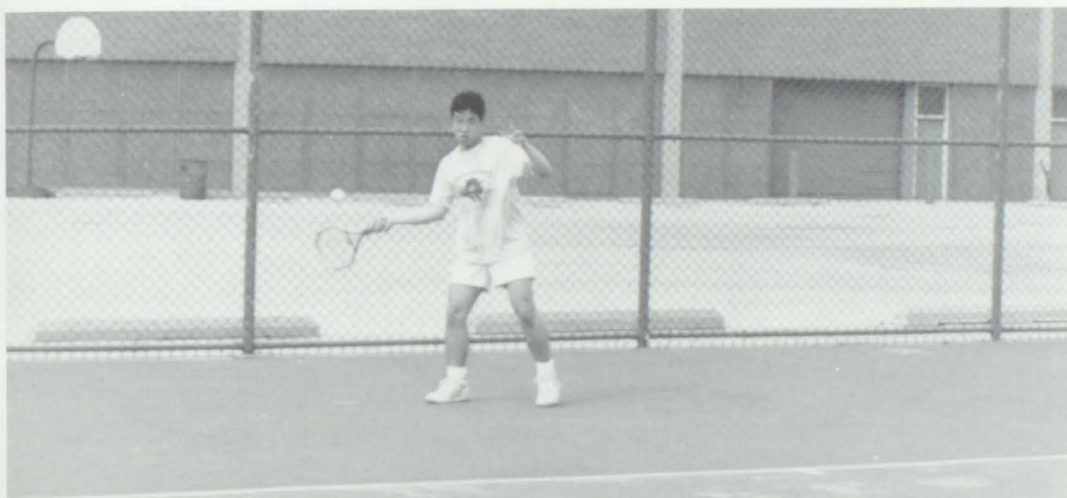

Balancing School and School Sports Competition

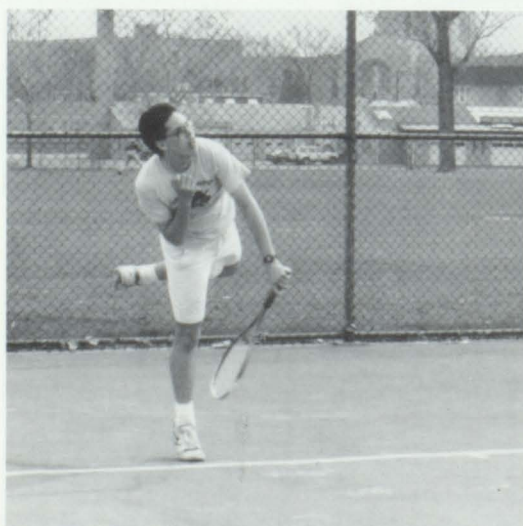

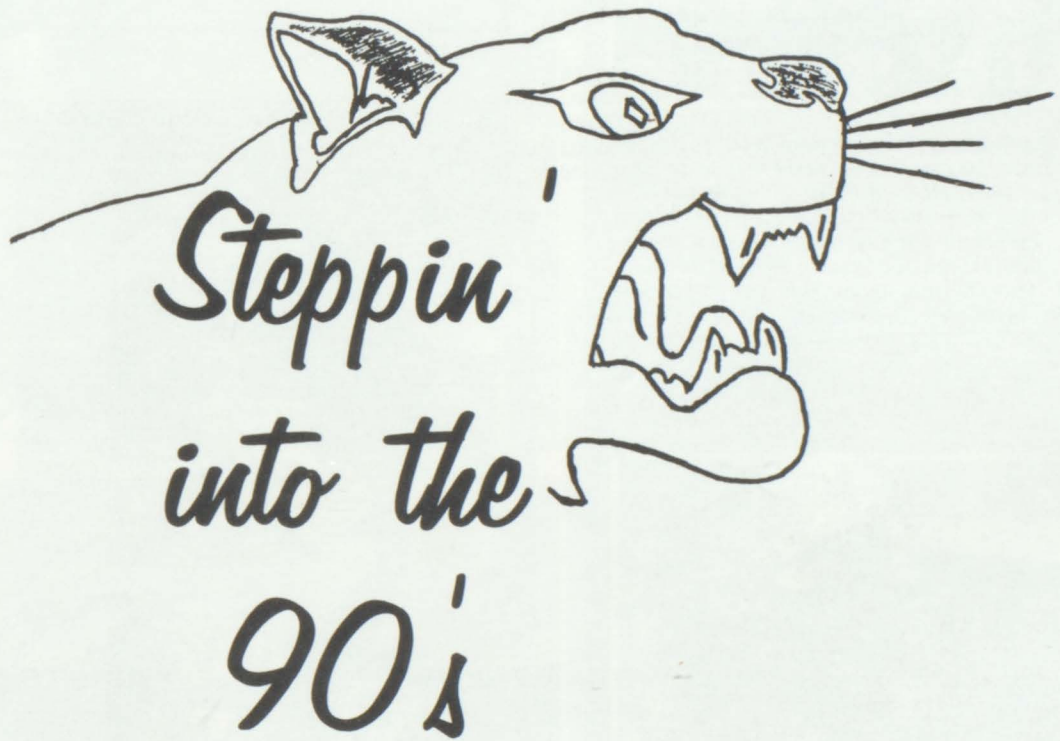

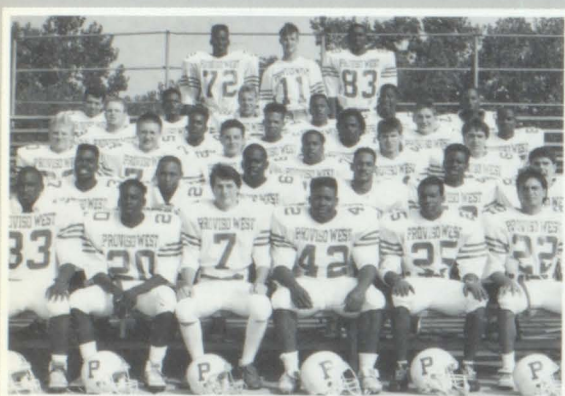

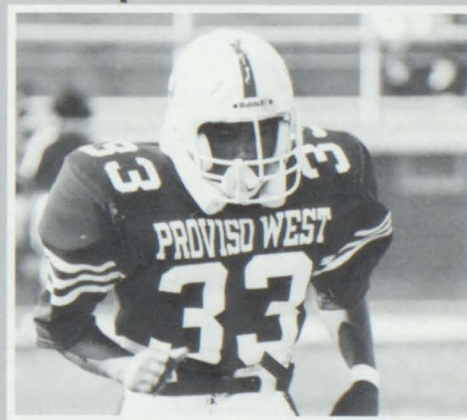

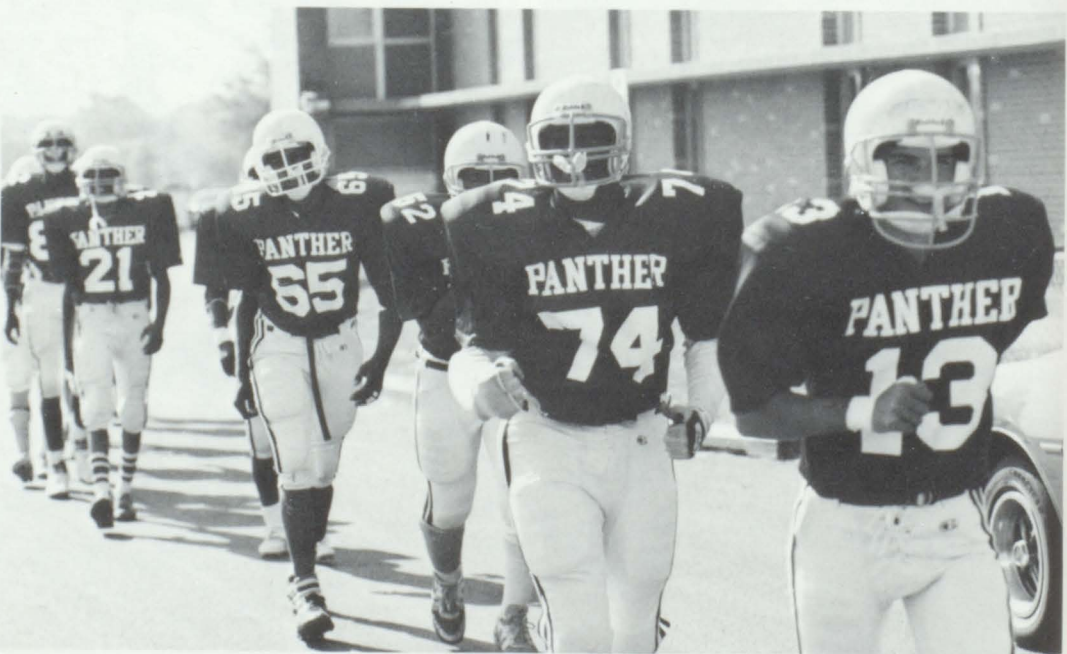

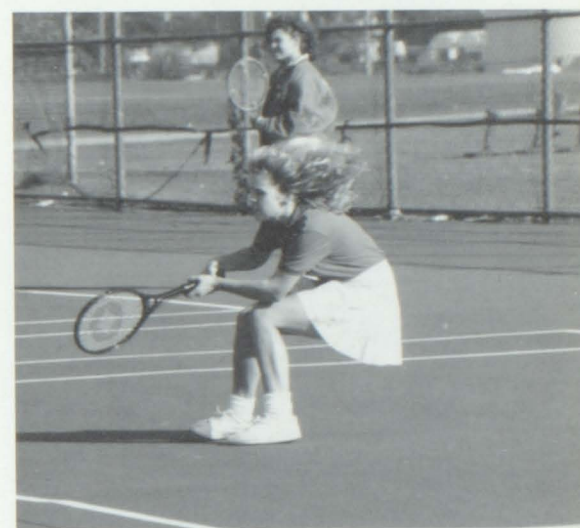
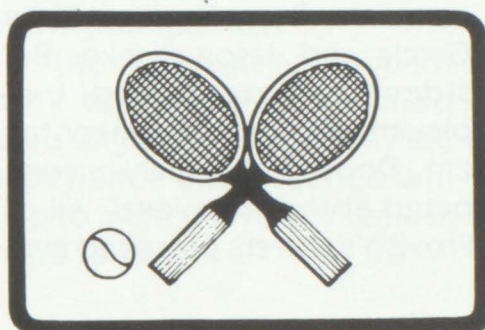
SMASHIN' into the 90's

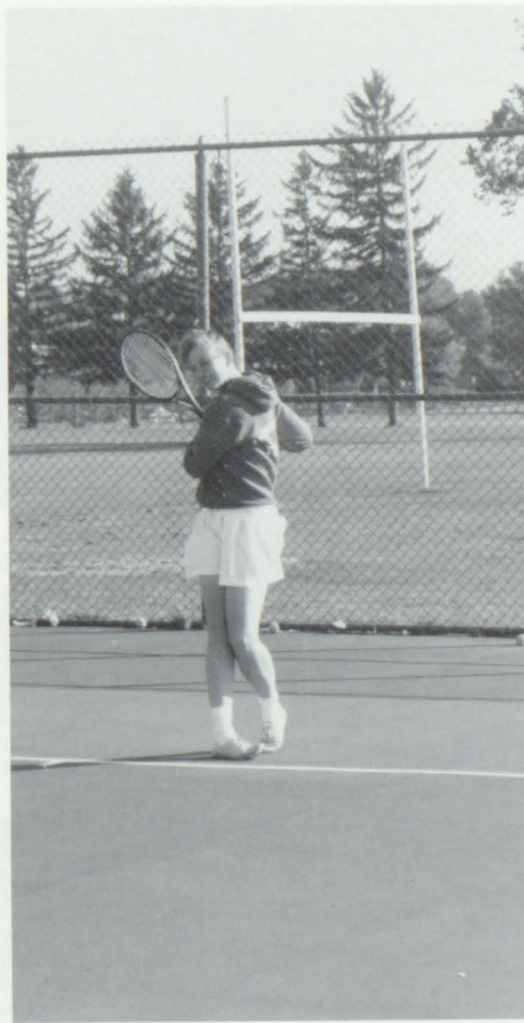

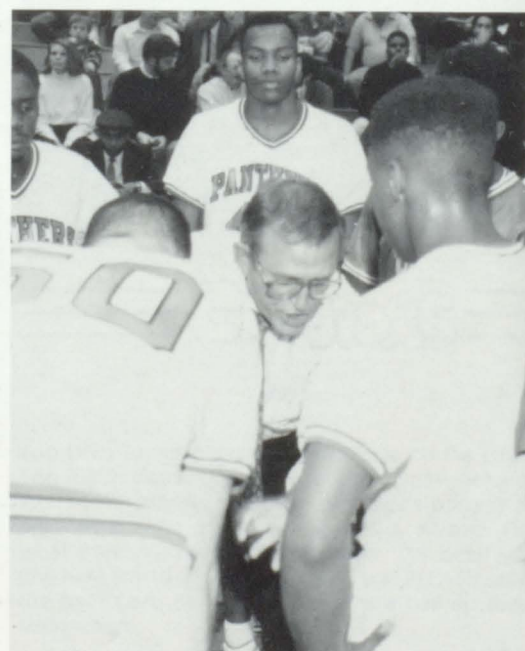

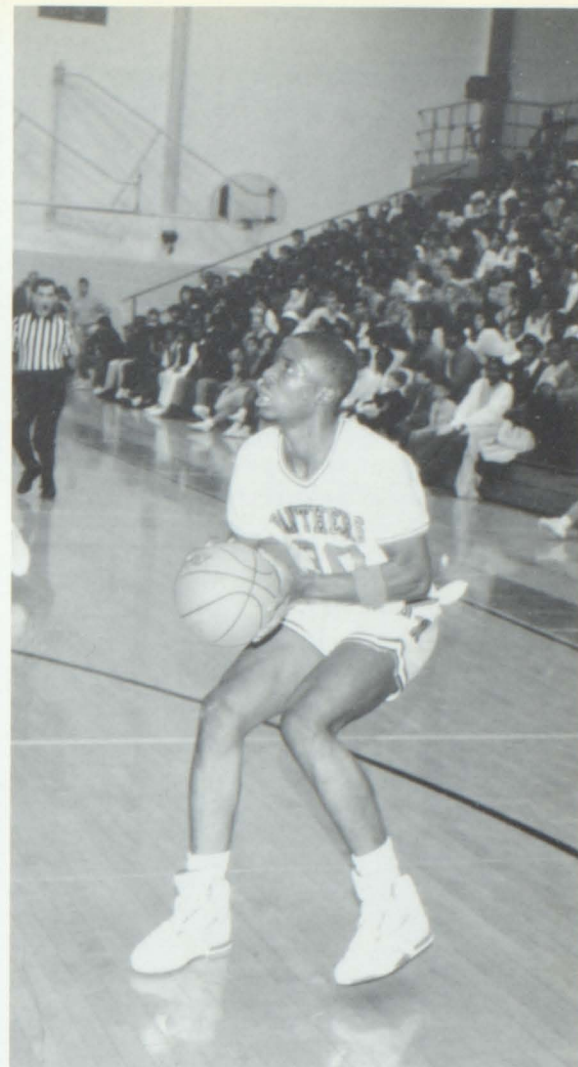
SHOOTIN' into the 90's

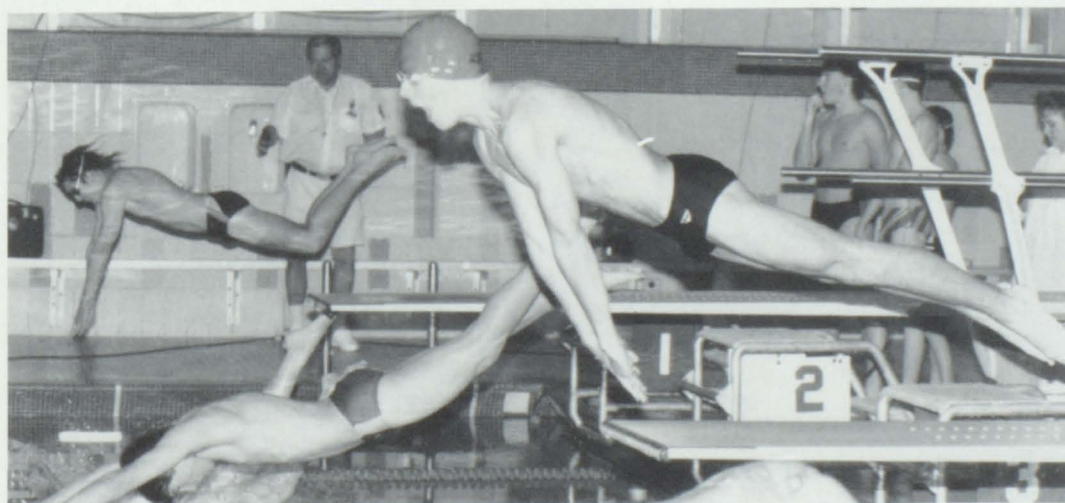
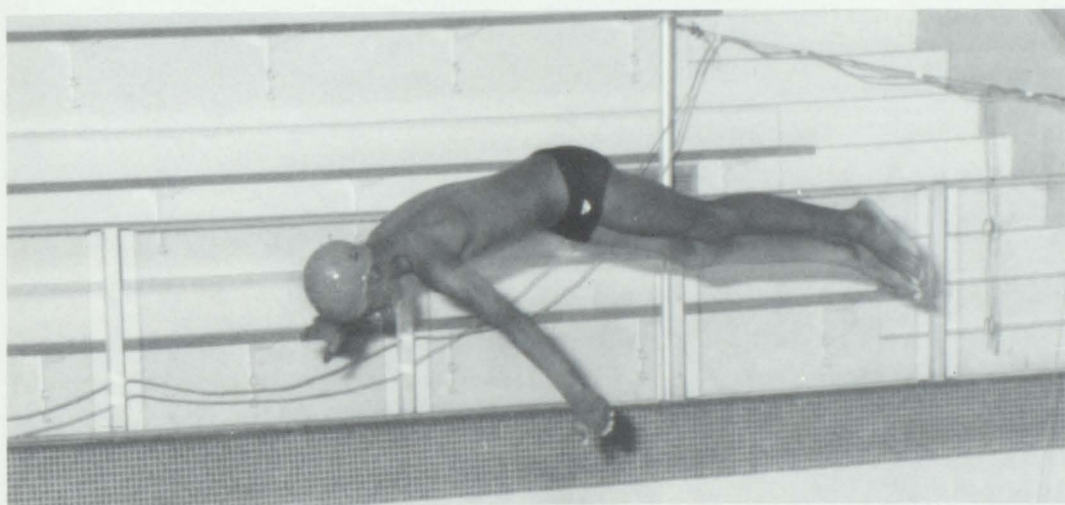
DIVIN' into the 90's

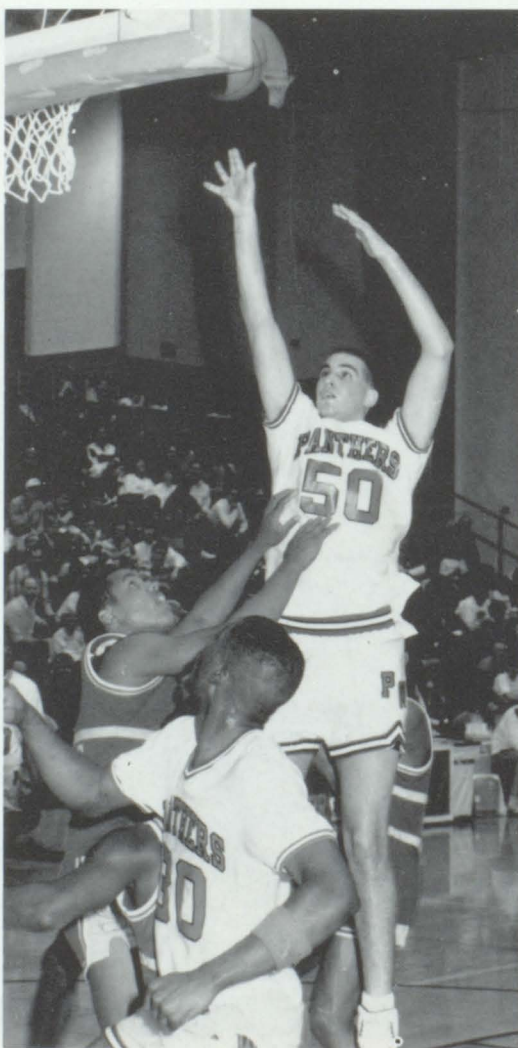

Holiday Tourney

The Proviso West Holiday Tournament has been regarded in the past as one of the top Christmas time tournaments of the state. In the past, this tournament has showcased players such as Isaih Thomas, Mark Aguirre and Marcus Liberty. In the past 28 years, Proviso's tournament has produced 6 state champions. Evanston (1968), Proviso East (1969, 1974), Lyons (1970), Morgan Park (1976) and King (1986). This year Proviso welcomed 3 new teams to their line-up. Taking the place of Rockford, Boylan, Downers Grove South, and Highland Park are Bloom, South Shore, and Chicago Vocational. First round matches include Westinghouse vs. St. Martin de Porres, Thornridge vs. Evanston, Lyons Township vs. Wendell Phillips, Chicago Vocational vs. New Trier, Proviso West vs. Collins, St. Josephs vs. Fenwick, and Bloom vs. South Shore.

Proviso West advanced to the semifinals with a victory over Collins by the score of 82-69 and a victory over CVS by the score of 81-74. Proviso West took 4th place by losing to 3rd place Proviso East by the score of 67-65. Underdogs St. Joseph received 1st place honors by defeating Fenwick and Thornridge.

Mr. Lowell Lucas

Lowell Lucas, who has been coaching basketball at Proviso West for 20 years, is a great example of a teacher who really cares. Living by the saying, "The sun will still come up tomorrow," Coach Lucas is able to live each day as a learning experience and "gives his all" toward the improvement of the teams and school. As a reward for giving his all, Coach Lucas was named "Coach of the Year" in 1989 by Life Publications and I. B. C. A. District 5.

Mr. Don Kohlmann

This year, a "great" coach retires. Mr. Don B. Kohlmann has been at Proviso West for 29 years. We all know Coach Kohlmann as the head Girls' Track team coach, but he started at West as freshman Boys' Basketball and Assistant Varsity Football coach in 1961.

In addition to his coaching these teams, he coached Boys' Track and Sophomore Soccer. As the head Boys' Track coach, his teams earned 2 conference championships and 2 State District championships. Under his leadership, the 1968 Boys' Track team won the State Track Championship. As Boys' coach, the team won 74 meets, tied one, and lost only 15 meets! He coached 4 individual state champions and 7 All-State runners.

Mr. Kohlmann has now coached the Girls' Track teams for 10 years. During this span, he has coached 4 Conference Championship teams. The teams won 4 State Sectional titles and 10 invitational titles. There were 8 All-State runners, and 4 All-State relay teams. And the list goes on.

In order to be a coach for 29 years, you have to love sports and have patience

with the athletes. These ideas definitely describe Coach Kohlmann. As a former athlete, Mr. Kohlmann said that he became a coach because he "just liked to play sports and athletics." According to Regina Buford, "He is a great coach. If we need him, he's always there."

Never say never. Coach Kohlmann said, "Anybody can be successful in sports. You can get more recognition if you do the best you can do." "Because Mr. Kohlmann did not allow his athletes to say 'I can't,' he was a very successful track coach, and he produced many successful track teams", said Nancy Terrell.

Regina Buford simply states, "We love him."

On his retiring, Mr. Kohlmann states, "It has been a good 29 years. I'll miss a lot of people. Now it's time to start a 3rd phase. It's a whole new ball game." Well, one thing is for sure, Proviso West will not be the same in the 90's without Mr. Kohlmann.

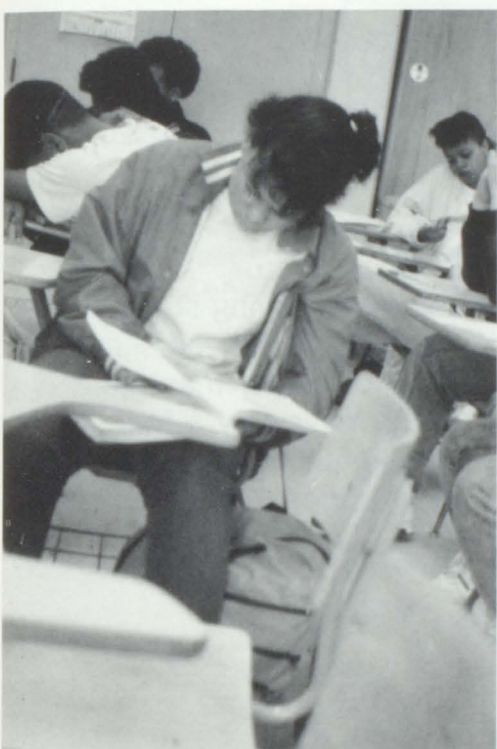

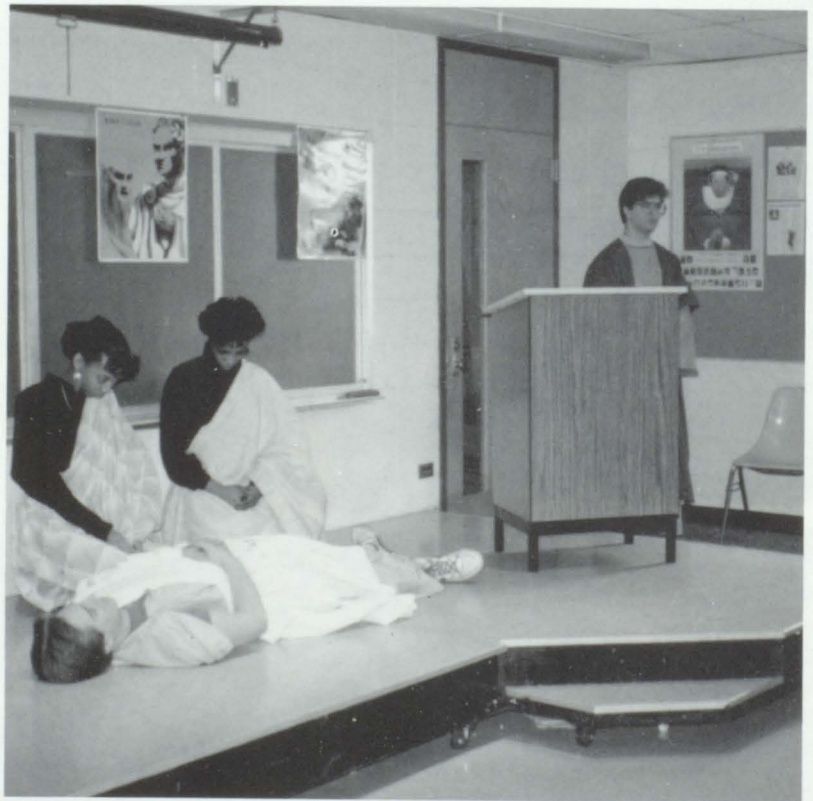
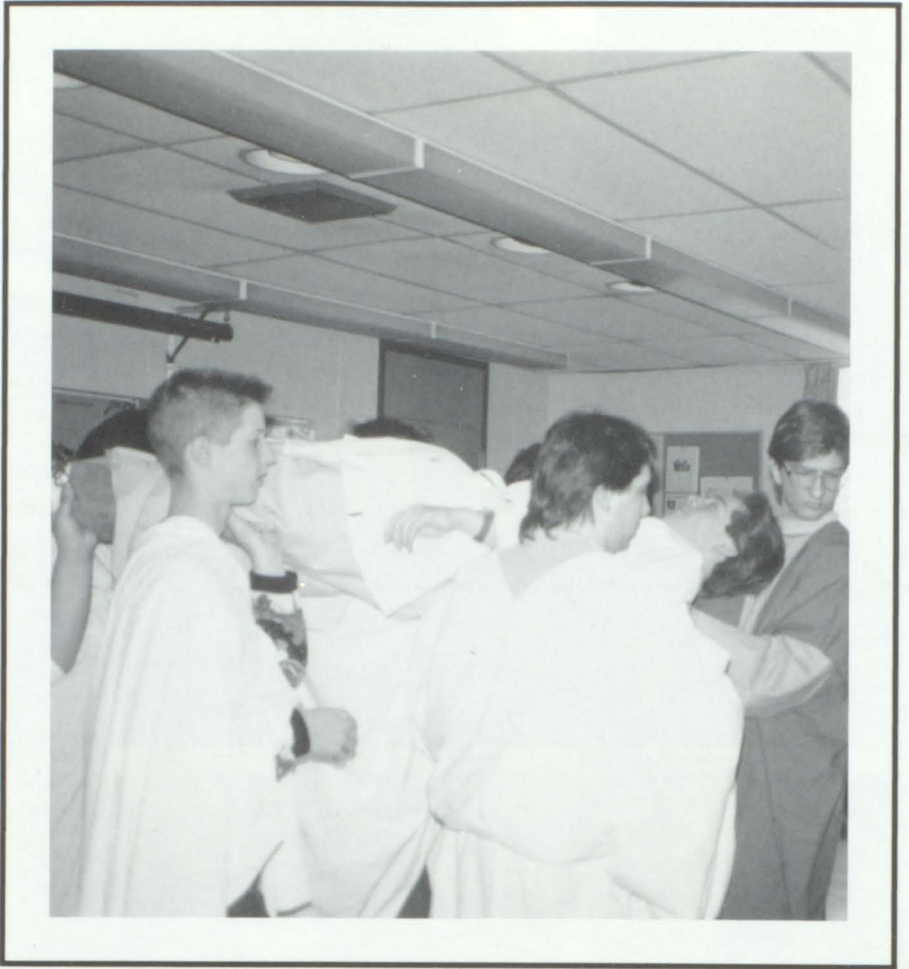


Julius Caesar: the Sophomore Saga

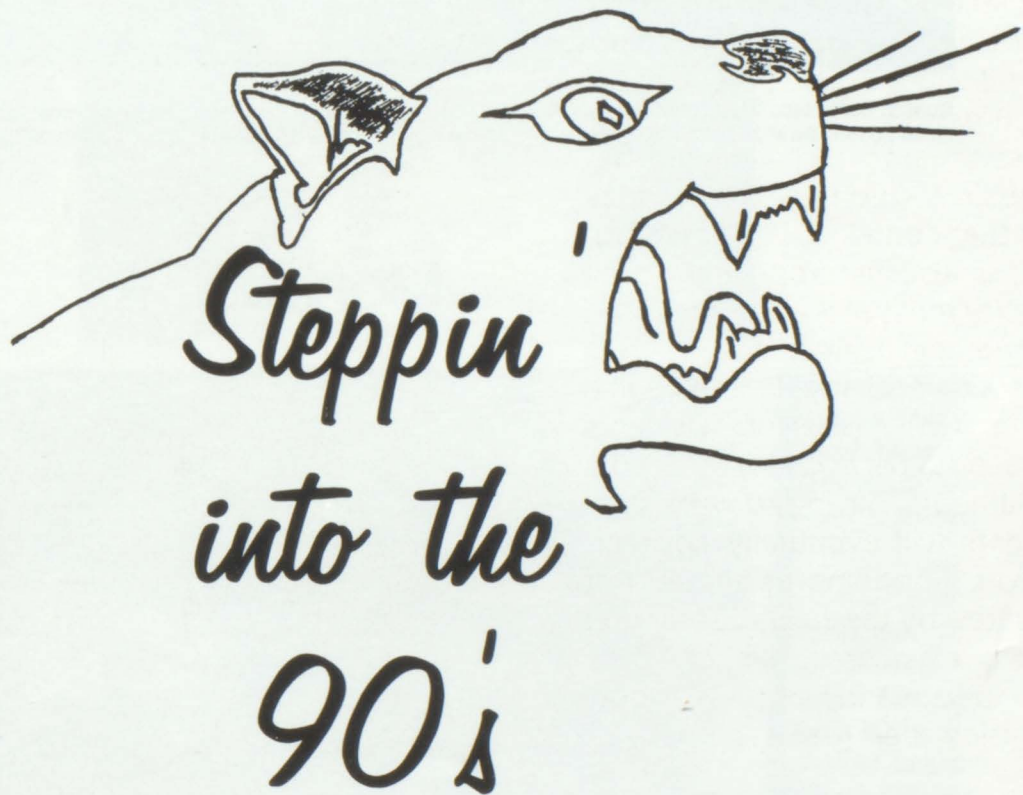

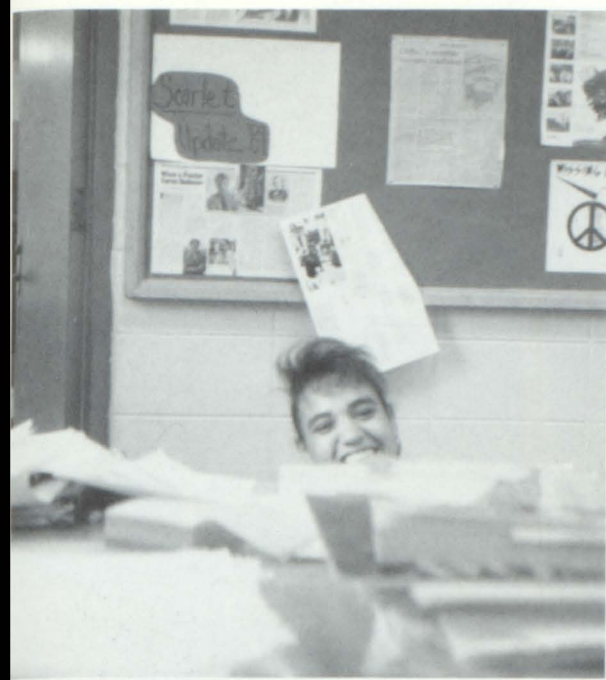
There should be fear in our hearts that death is possible. No one really wants death, but like our friend Dario, some

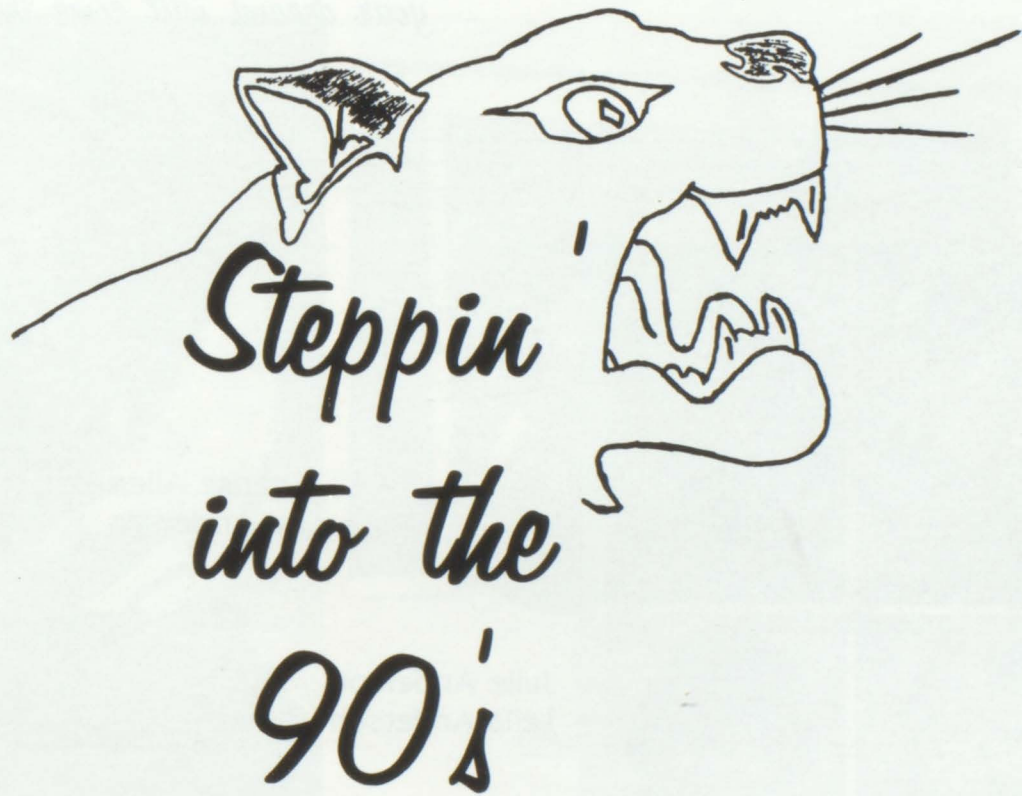


Now that's the *spirit*, Juniors!!!

- Bernard Goetz** shot four teenagers he thought would mug him; he was then known as the Subway Vigilante.
- the **Oliver North/Iran Contra** scandal.
- the day in October of 1987, when the stock market fell **Black Monday**.
- the improving U.S./Soviet relations with **Gorbachev** resulting in arms reductions by both countries.
- Pope John Paul II** was shot.
- Governor Thompson** ruled the 80's
- foreign companies bought out many American companies
- Chicago saw Mayors **Byrne, Washington, Sawyer, and Daley**
- George Bush** replaced Reagan.

TECHNOLOGICAL / SCIENTIFIC ADVANCES

This time period saw development in the areas of personal conveniences. Many of these inventions were considered essential parts of peoples' lives.

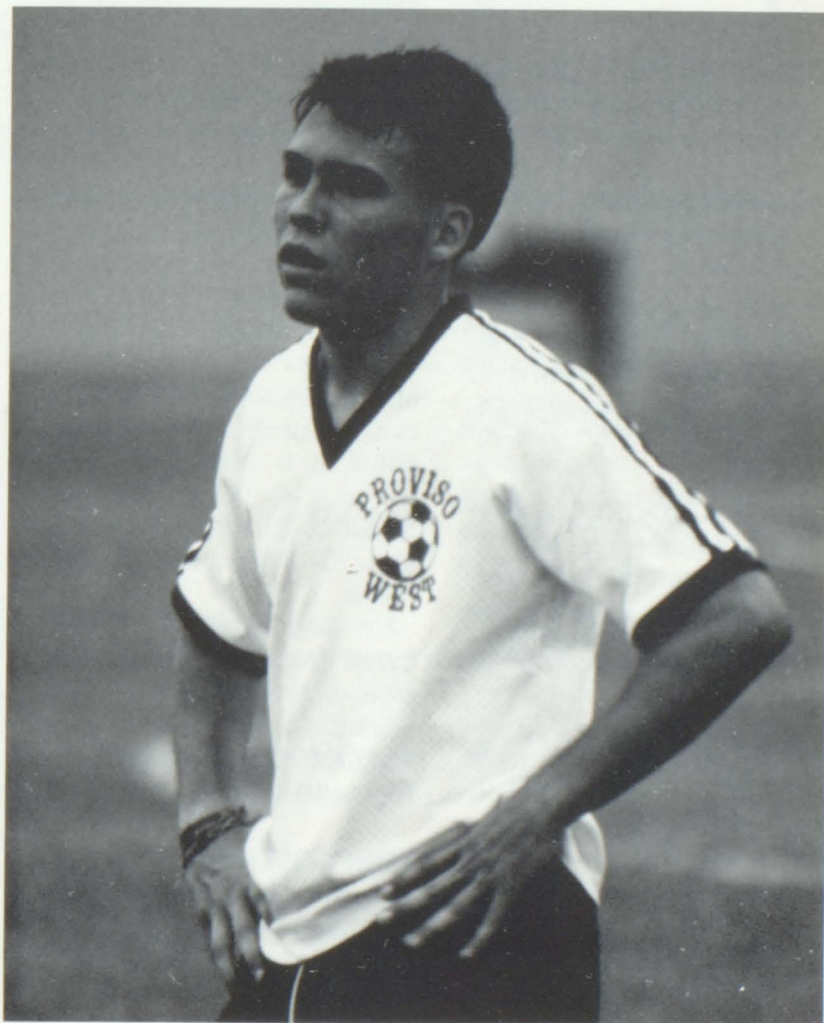
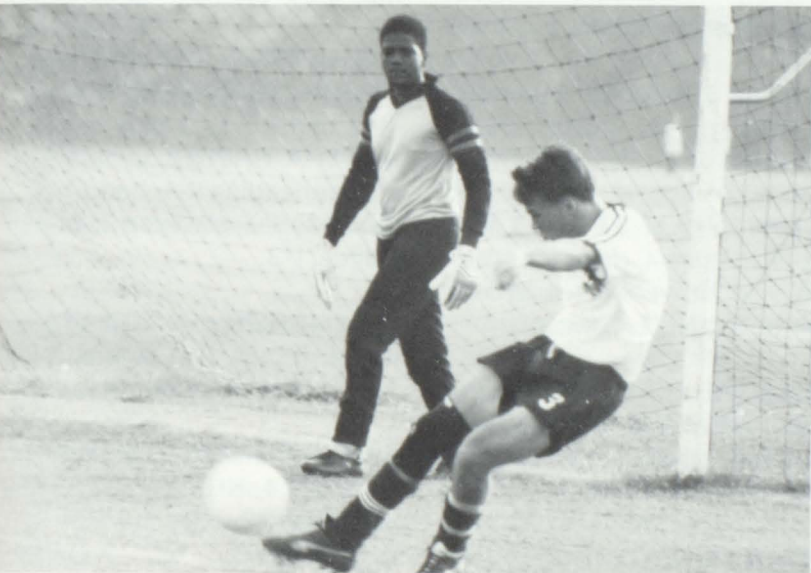
Roger remembers two games
